Early Gains Wiped Out On Montreal Mart.

MONTREAL, Aug. 31.—(CP)—The confident opening stride of the Stock Market slackened into a faltering shuffle near the close today, and most gains were clipped to fractions. Papers and metals led the opening rally but received half-hearted support from the others. St. Lawrence Paper preferred added 1-2 points. Price and Hudson Bay 5-8, Smelters 1-2, St. Lawrence Corporation 3-8 and Noranda 1-2. Price preferred dropped two points. Construction Issues were quiet but on the firm side. Cement and Steel of Canada rose 1-2 each and Dominion 1-8. Equipments slipped lower at the close, National Steel Car easing 1-4 and Dominion Coal "B" 1-8. Massey-Harris improved slightly 3-4. In the Utilities, Bell sank 3-4 and Power Corporation 1-2 while Shawinigan and Brazilian gained small fractions. Total Sales: 62,600; Industrials 16,400; Mines 47,200; Bonds \$1,100.

CROP REPORT

GENERAL

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the head office of the Bureau of Montreal from its Branches. Our Managers have knowledge of each local situation and are in touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

PRAIRIE PROVINCES

ALBERTA—Intermittent rains and lower temperatures during the past week have generally retarded harvesting and delayed ripening of late grains. Slight red rust damage is reported in the northeast and central areas. Precipitation may have lowered yields. The present crop situation is very satisfactory. There has been no damage from frost. Saskatchewan—While harvesting has been retarded by cool, wet weather, some wheat is now nearing completion in all but the central and west-central districts. Grasshoppers are still active and in the areas affected, coarse grains are being harvested for feed to prevent further damage. Pastures are good. Manitoba—Threshing is well under way in most districts, although operations have been retarded by scattered showers. Rust has reduced yields and grains of coarse grains and non-resistant varieties of wheat, but owing to the high percentage of rust on returns on the whole will be fairly satisfactory. Pastures are in good condition.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Eastern Townships and Ottawa Valley—Harvesting of grains is well advanced with better than average yields. Barley and oats are in good condition. A heavy crop of fodder and sweet corn appears assured. Pickling of later varieties of canning peas is now completed with the exception of some. Small fruits are plentiful but apples will be a light crop. Potatoes and other root crops are fairly abundant and in good condition. Progressing satisfactorily. Pastures continue in excellent condition. Cutting of a good average crop of tobacco has commenced. Lower St. Lawrence and Lake St. John District—Frequent rains have caused some damage and delayed the cutting of grains, but crops are mostly in good condition and satisfactory yields are anticipated. Pastures, hay and other roots are doing well. Small fruits are plentiful. Pastures are in good condition.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Threshing of above-average yields of fall wheat of good quality nears completion and harvesting of spring crops has commenced. Root crops and small fruits promise well. In Nova Scotia and New Brunswick variable weather has prevailed, with heavy precipitation in many districts and further deterioration of potato crops through excessive moisture is reported. While some damage to grains from rust and lodging is indicated, the outlook generally is for a good yield. Apple orchards continue to make favorable progress and a good average crop is anticipated. Pickling of the early varieties of fruit has commenced. Pastures are in excellent condition.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Threshing of grain has commenced on the lower mainland and Vancouver Island, and yields will be below average. It is anticipated that the potato crop will be 80 per cent average. The tomato crop, which is now being picked is a good average, but there has been some damage by rain. Peaches, plums and prunes are now moving to market in volume and the fruit is of good quality. Apples are sizing and colouring well. The following yields are now indicated: prunes and plums 95 per cent average, peaches 80 per cent, apples 85 per cent, peaches 80 per cent. Coddling moth is very active and continued spraying has been necessary. Prunes are in poor condition. Irrigation water is low in some districts, but recent rains have kept the situation from becoming serious.

Toronto and New York — Stocks higher.

Montreal — Utilities lower; other groups higher. — Wheat 1-2 to 1-4 cent lower. — New York — Cotton and coffee lower; rubber and sugar higher.

Livestock

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Aug. 31.—Receipts of Montreal livestock markets: cattle 314; calves 70; hogs 15; sheep and lambs 231. Fresh arrivals of cattle were made up of cows and bulls. Medium cows sold up to \$4 and common butchers were mostly \$3 to 3.50. Calves were firm, good weaners \$7.50 to \$9 with medium kinds selling up to \$6.50 and common light weaners down to \$6. Grass-ers ranged from \$4 to 5. Good ewes and wethers were \$8.50. Bucks and culs were cut \$2 per cwt. Sheep were from \$3 to \$4. The few hogs offered were trucked in and sold at \$10 for bacon. Selects drew \$1 per hog premium with the usual cuts on off grades. On Maritime livestock markets prices on rail grade hogs advanced \$3 to \$12.90. Sows remained steady at \$8 dressed weight. Live hogs advanced 25 cents to \$9.15 weighed off trucks, some remaining steady at \$8.75 off trucks. Good steers \$6 with fair steers at \$5 and common down to \$4.50. Good heifers were \$6.75, medium \$5.75, fair \$4.75 and common \$2.50 to \$4. Butcher cows were \$2.50 to \$4 and canner cows \$2 to \$2.50. Bulls ranged from \$2 to \$3.50. Grass calves were from \$2.75 to \$3.50 and veal calves from \$3.50 to \$7.50.

Currencies

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—The British Pound slumped again early today before exchange control authorities intervened. The pound fell to only 1-16 of a cent below Tuesday's close to 48 1/2-16. Still shaken out of the outcome of the election, the minority government in Czechoslovakia, European capital poured into the safety of gold and the United States dollar. The French franc also declined in sympathy with the British unit, losing .001-8 of a cent to 27 1/2-16. The Guilders gained .03 of a cent, however, and the Swiss franc .02 of a cent. Belgians were .02 of a cent lower. The Canadian dollar was off 1-16 of a cent at 99 1/2-32. (C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Aug. 31.—Pound sterling declined 1-32 of a cent to \$4.86 13-32 on Montreal Foreign Exchange today while the French franc held about even at 27 1/2-32 cents. The United States dollar advanced 1-32 of a cent to 1-8 per cent premium.

Grain

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WINNIPEG, Aug. 31.—A recovery movement started in North America wheat markets late today after prices slumped to the lowest levels in several years. Short covering at Winnipeg and firmness at Chicago resulted in wheat futures here closing only 1-2-1/4 cent lower, Oct. at 62 1/4. Now the same, Dec. 61 1/2-5/8 and May 65 1-8 cents. Winnipeg prices, skidding downward for the sixth week, dropped more than 1-2 cents after declines of more than a cent Monday and Tuesday. Five year low levels were touched as the December futures reached the 60 cent range. Trading appeared to be mostly spreading operations involving sales at Winnipeg though outside interests were on both sides of the market. It was suggested some of the sales were hedging of new crop wheat as country markets in the Prairies continued over the 4,000,000 bushel mark daily. Coarse grain dealings were routine with prices following wheat.

MINING

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Aug. 31.—The Toronto stock market reacted to a considerable advance in commodity trading today and the closing tone was mainly firm. Trading was heavy in the cheaper goods while a few industrials turned in considerable quantity at better prices. The gold share index advanced 1.20 while the base metals added 28 and the industrial 34. Western oils finished practically unchanged. Volume was about even with Tuesday's turnover at 630,000 shares. A few of the penny goods, notably Dornier-Siscoe, Ashley, Navy, Faulkenham, Gillies Lake, Granada and Lapa Cadillac changed hands in volume and all were strong except Navybob. Among the medium-price issues higher prices in active trading ruled for MacLeod-Cockshutt, Moneta, O'Brien, Pamour and Tech Hughes. Macaness was strong in slow trading. Mining Corporation added 16 cents and Pickle Crow firm 25 cents. Selling of dividend \$1 Lake Shore posted a setback of only 1-4. Hollinger was slightly stronger and Dome, McIntyre and Buffalo-Anglican unchanged. The close was up for Hudson Bay and Noranda and slightly lower for International Nickel and Smelters. Waite-Amulet made two spurts to the 5.70 mark and settled at 5.50 at the close, off 5 cents net. Interlisted industrial leaders traded in New York market to a better price level and gains predominated in the steel, utility, food, implement and bank groups. Action in the Western oils picked up a little in the late afternoon and gains were netted by Calgary-Edmonton, Brown, Cominol, Home Oil and Prairie Royalties.
