Government Aid For Chicken Clubs

The Provincial Department of Agriculture is undertaking this year, as formerly, to pay \$4.00 per hundred on baby chicks for boys and girls clubs. The club shall consist of ten members, either boys or girls.

Chicks must be bought from Provincial Hatcheries, and whose eggs are all from blood tested flocks. Brooders would be necessary in successfully carrying out this work, and our Department has decided to stand half the cost of the heater for the brooder house; the balance to be paid by the owner of the club. Our Department would retain ownership in the heater for a period of three years. After the expiration of that time, the heater having been used for those three years would then become the property of the purchaser.

I would like the people to have an interest in poultry in this province, and many who have not thought of the matter up to the present time, to realize that the money brought into the province by the sale of eggs and poultry is a very substantial amount of the present revenue of the province, and when we come to realize that it is necessary for Prince Edward Island to import six carloads of western chickens in order to supply the requirements of the province, which include the necessary product used by canning factories; so that all can see the need for increased production.

Assuring all concerned in this matter of the co-operation of our Department and earnestly asking for an organization of the poultry growers of the province.
