## AN ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING

Held in the Court House at Alberton for the Purpose of Discussing the Placing of a Steamer on the Route Between Chatham and Sydney, Calling at P. E. Island—  
\$10,000 Subscribed.

A large and influential meeting of the inhabitants of Alberton and vicinity was held in the Court House on the evening of Jan. 13th, for the purpose of discussing the feasibility of placing a steamer on the route between Chatham, N. B. and Sydney, C.B., calling at the ports on the north side of P. E. Island.

Mr. D. Montgomery was called to the chair. Mr. C. A. Woodman in his opening remarks showed clearly the benefits to be derived, and the necessity of a steamer on the above route.

A letter was also read from Wedlock Bros. of Stanley Bridge, urging the formation of a company as quickly as possible, so that the boat might be ready at the opening of navigation, and that subscriptions to the amount of \$10,000 had

already been secured by them.

The project was then discussed by Thos. Wilkinson, James E. Birch, F. L. Rogers, Rev. A. E. Burke, A. F. McArthur and others, each speaker emphasizing the importance of forming a company and going to work as speedily as possible.

On motion a committee consisting of the following gentlemen was appointed, viz:

James E. Birch.

The committee is for the purpose of securing shares and making such other arrangements as may be necessary. The promoters of the scheme are very enthusiastic and feel confident that it will prove a success.

### First Italian Woman Lawyer.

Rome has the distinction of possessing the first feminine lawyer of Italy, in the person of Signorina Teresa Labriola. She had just passed her last examination with honors, and is now a full-fledged lawyer, but has not inscribed herself among the advocates, as she does not desire to champion the "new woman," but to devote herself to the philosophy of law. After taking her degree she addressed a commission of the University of Rome for three hours, really putting the reverend doctors to the blush by her deep knowledge of her subject, and delighting them with her eloquence. She now lectures at the university, together with her father and brother.

She is the first woman in Italy to take the degree of doctor of law in modern times, although in the middle ages feminine professors of medicine were by no means few. Signorina Labriola in German on her mother's side and Italian on her father's, so is fully imbued with German science, and is already a well-known writer on scientific subjects.—Philadelphia North American.

How the Dominion Premier Explains His Breadth of Views.

R. Holmes, M. P., West Huron, tells the following: Some one asked Sir Wilfrid Laurier how it came he that being a Roman Catholic, was so broad in his views and tendencies towards others. His answer in effect to this was as follows: "Up to the age of 18 I could speak nothing but French, and I hired out with a Scotch farmer in order to learn English. Every morning this good man held family worship, and the different members of the household read in turn a verse of the Bible. In the course of time I was invited to remain with the family while morning service was held, and I must admit that the impressions I there received remained with me through life and have undoubtedly influenced me more than I know."

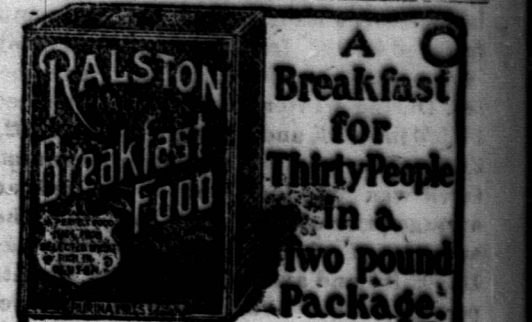
