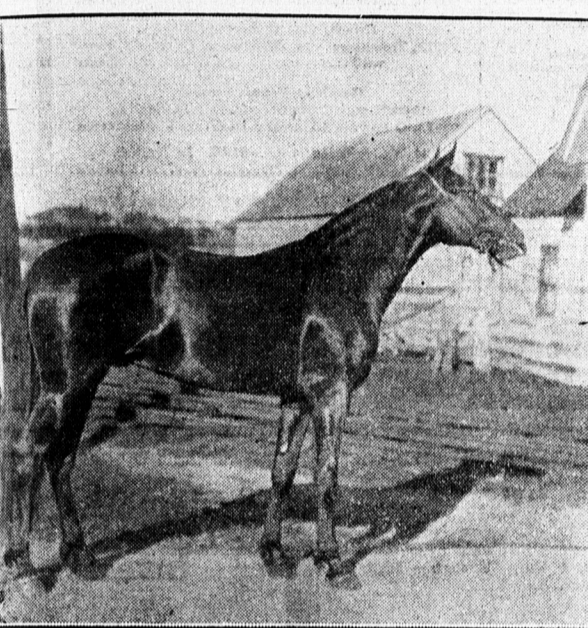

UNITED STATES STEEL WORKING 73 PERCENT

NEW YORK, April 1—The Steel Corporation is operating about 73 percent of its blast furnace capacity. Another furnace at South Chicago will probably be blown in shortly, which will bring operations up to approximately 74 per cent. Shipments of the Steel Corporation continue heavy, and are now estimated at 32,000 tons a day. Estimates as to daily average orders received in March range between 37,000 and 40,000 tons.

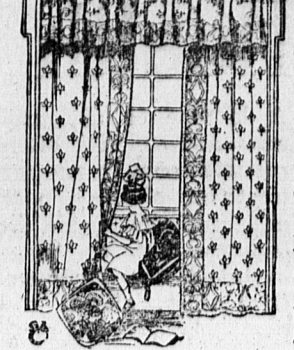

MARY SUFFRAGETTES DODGE THE BRITISH CENSUS TAKER

LONDON, April 2—Except as an advertisement for their cause, the opposition of the suffragettes to taking of the census of London tonight was apparently a rather futile demonstration. The midnight meetings, which it was proposed to hold at Trafalgar Square and Westminster with the object of marching in procession to a skating rink where the women were to spend the night proved a fiasco. Only about a score of suffragettes appeared at either rendezvous. At the skating rink there were exciting scenes through the enormous crowds which had gathered to watch the proceedings. They blocked the entrances and prevented the ingress of the suffragettes, some of whom fainted in the crush.

Ultimately a large force of police was called out to clear the neighborhood. Many women spent the night at the rink, but it is understood that they were counted by the census officials as they entered. A number of well known women placed their residences in the west end at the disposal of the suffragettes, who are sleeping on sofas, tables and chairs, their hostesses taking the risk of being fined for refusing to account for their guests. In Edinburgh, Birmingham and other cities, the suffragettes adopted similar tactics.
