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MAY BE MURDER NEAR MONTREAL

The Result of a Picnic Held Last Week—Parties now Under Arrest in Connection With Case

MONTREAL, Aug. 7.—(Special)—On Thursday Dorion Mitchell, Chas. Kernish, Mrs. Kernish and her sister Mrs. Girard rowed to Isle Ronde in Lake St. Lewis where the day was spent in merry making. Towards evening Mrs. Girard wanted to return and Kernish started to row her back leaving Mitchell and Mrs. Kernish on the island. A few minutes later Mrs. Kernish was heard to scream and her husband returned to the island. He picked up a couple of empty bottles and set out to take vengeance on Mitchell who had disappeared. Saturday's morning Mitchell's body was found in the water and the other three are now under arrest. They all assert that the man must have been drowned.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—(Special)—One man died of yellow fever at New York quarantine hospital today, making the third case this summer, the highest record for years. These cases all came from Panama and not from any infected districts of U. S. NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 7.—(Special)—Yellow fever report up to six o'clock is—New cases, 28, Total cases 533, Deaths today 8, Total deaths 105.

PEACE SESSION OPENS TUESDAY

Russian and Japanese Envoys Go to Portsmouth N. H. Today

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—On the deck of the Mayflower at Oyster Bay tomorrow the peace envoys of Japan and Russia will meet and will be formally introduced by President Roosevelt. Under convoy of the Galveston the Mayflower and the Dolphin will sail for Portsmouth, arriving there on Monday morning. The first session of the conference will be held on Tuesday. The question of whether the Russian or the Japanese peace envoys shall be presented first to Governor McLane when they are officially received at Portsmouth on Monday next is another of the most troublesome for the experts on etiquette, too grave, in fact, to be settled by New Hampshire officials. It was accordingly referred to President Roosevelt. Rumor has it that it was originally referred to the state department, which sent to Paris to ascertain what the proceedings were in the Behring Sea or North Sea cases. Two points are mainly to be considered. One is the question of seniority and the other ambassadorial standing. The Japanese envoy was the first to arrive in this country and the argument is advanced that for this reason he should have precedence. On the other hand the Russian government maintains an embassy at Washington, while the Japanese are represented only by a minister, so higher ambassadorial rank is claimed for Russia than for Japan. The meeting tomorrow between Baron Komura and Baron Rosen, the junior Russian envoy, coming so soon after the capture of the Russian garrison at Sakhalin island will be a time of reminiscence for both of them. It was due to Rosen more than any other person that the Russians obtained the original Sakhalin concession from Japan. He was only secretary to the legation at Tokio then but he so ingratiated himself with the prominent persons of the country, while the representatives of the other countries held aloof, that the Sakhalin deal was consummated before they knew it. It will be recalled that England was particularly incensed at the time over what it called the negligence or at least lack of foresight on the part of its representative in Japan. Rosen was always popular with the Japanese and for this more than for any other reason he has been appointed to accompany the man-moth Witte. When he left Tokio four days after the first shots of the war were fired at Port Arthur it was Komura who gave him his walking papers and showed him all kinds of courtesy.

MAIL LOOTED AT CAMPBELLTON

Bank Cheques and Drafts Recovered by Policeman

CAMPBELLTON, N. B., Aug. 4.—Yesterday I. C. R. Officer Noble found a number of letters, bank cheques and drafts bearing date July 28th and 29th, in a flange car on a back siding in the I. C. R. yard here. Some of the cheques were for sums as high as \$400 drawn on the National Bank of Canada and Provincial Bank of Canada. Upon investigating the matter Officer Noble discovered that two or three boys had entered the mail cars lying in the yard over Sunday on July 30th, and had helped themselves to a quantity of mail matter, taking some to the flange car where the letters were opened. The boys evidently did not know the value of the cheques, or else thought it unwise to take them, as they were left in the car. Later on in the evening Officer Noble looked up the two young lads, Gordon Lewis and Ernest Pitre, in connection with the affair, holding them on a charge of trespassing on the I. C. R.; awaiting the arrival of Post Office Inspector D. R. Collier, when a more serious charge will probably be laid.

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WIFE FINDS HER HUSBAND'S BDDY

By a Dream—it is Located by Searchers--Detectives are at Work

OMAHA, Neb., Aug. 3.—Through the aid of a dream, in which she saw a muffled figure following her husband, Mrs. I. R. Andrews, President of the Omaha Woman's Club, last night succeeded in locating the dead body of her husband in the Platte River. The dream occurred last Friday night, when Mr. Andrews was at Cedar Creek, one hundred miles from Omaha. Mr. Andrews disappeared that night and was not heard of again. He was a wealthy lawyer of this city. Mr. Andrews had gone to a gravel pit to pay off his employes. Saturday morning he was missing. A telegram was sent to his wife, but because of her strange dream the night before she had already started search when the telegram arrived. On arriving at the gravel pit she was informed that Mr. Andrews had gone down the river the night before. She insisted that in her dream he had gone up stream. Parties searched in both directions, and last night the body was found near where she had seen the figure following her husband in the dream. Detectives are searching for clues of murder.

BETTER FEELING BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND GERMANY

LONDON, Aug. 3.—The forthcoming visit of a British fleet to the Baltic Sea appears more than likely to mark the beginning of more cordial relations, between Great Britain and Germany, instead of as has been suggested in some quarters, adding to the friction now existing. The proposed visit was known to the German foreign office months ago and suggestions that objections to it were raised by Germany are unfounded. Ernest Geo. Pettiman, secretary to the Admiralty to-day in reply to questions, stated definitely that no protests regarding the visit of the fleet had been received. Friendly comment on the pending cruise from German Baltic ports betrays the belief that it will help along King Edward's desire for good relations between Germany and Great Britain and the announcement of Emperor William's support of the candidacy of Prince Charles, of Denmark, for the Norwegian throne, is accepted as an indication that the German ruler proposes to work in the same direction. The report is received that Emperor William will meet King Edward during the latter's forthcoming trip to Marienburg.

RUSSIA NOT DECEIVED CZAR KNOWS ARMY'S PERIL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—On very high authority it can be said that, while the Russian peace envoys will do a good deal of sparring after the treaty meeting is opened in Portsmouth this month, they will in the end concede all the genuine demands of the Tokio government. That Japan will ask more than it hopes to obtain, there is no doubt, but this will be mainly for the purpose of winning her great object—a substantial indemnity. It is certain that M. Witte comes here with instructions to agree to a big war payment, and the split, if any, will come upon the size of it. That there will be a split is not regarded as likely by a diplomat who has had much to do with the preliminaries preceding the coming peace meeting. His information is to the effect that the Russian army in Manchuria is in a more precarious position than newspaper reports have indicated. The Russian Government knows all the facts about its army and realizes that a failure to conclude a treaty would bring about a battle so disastrous to the Czar's Manchurian army that immediately thereafter Japan would be in a position to force the most severe conditions upon its defeated foe. M. Witte and Baron Rosen are not at all deceived about the situation. Indeed it is known that M. Witte did not accept his great post until he obtained the widest latitude, and he comes ready to recognize the fact that Japan has been victorious in the war. Conditions in Russia as well as in Manchuria suggest the necessity of peace, and it is said confidently that a treaty will be signed in Portsmouth.

The plenipotentiaries will continue their journey by train. The Dolphin representatives anchored off the lightship here some hours later. The Japanese will go to Portsmouth by water, sailing tonight.

Of a Young Lady Who is Subsequently Found After Some Days Pale and Emaciated but Will Recover

ROCHESTER, MAINE, Aug. 6.—(Special)—Miss Mary A. Tucker, the Providence school teacher who disappeared from camp Ossipee last Tuesday was found this evening in the woods near South Lebanon. She was greatly exhausted and emaciated but hopes are entertained for her recovery. Large parties of residents have been searching for her all the week. She is not able to speak and nothing is yet known as to her wanderings. Her condition is pitiable.

FUNERAL OF LATE SUPERINTENDENT

Took Place in Moncton Saturday—Very Large Attendance Including Railway Men From all Eastern Canada

MONCTON, Aug. 6.—(Special)—The funeral of the late Supt. Price on Saturday afternoon was very largely attended, fully one hundred carriages following the hearse. The mourners included all the local officials and prominent railway men from nearly every road in Eastern Canada. Hon. H. R. Emmerson and Deputy Minister Butler attended the funeral and Supt. Sharp of the P. E. I. R. was also among those present.

EXPECTATIONS OF BRIGHTER FUTURE

Emperor of Russia's Councilors Looking into the Project of the National Assembly

ST. PETERSBURG, August 5.—The Emperor's councilors yesterday resumed consideration of the National Assembly project at Peterhof, penetrating deeply the nature and extent of the representation to be granted. The problem of acceding a voice in the proposed assembly to all classes and interests without giving undue weight to the representatives of the uneducated peasantry, comprising 67 per cent of the whole population, nor throwing control of the assembly into the hands of demagogues and agitators is one of the crucial points of the whole system, and is cause for the greatest perplexity both to those who drafted the original Boulgain project and to the ministers to which it is to be revised. Though no details of the discussion of Tuesday have appeared in print, several papers comment on the importance of the Peterhof conference and base on them great expectations of a brighter future of Russia.

MONARCH'S YACHT ARRESTED.

GLASGOW, Aug. 3.—The yacht of the Khedive of Egypt has been "arrested," as she lies in the harbor of Glasgow, by A. H. Gordon, a naval architect, who by this means seeks to establish his jurisdiction. He holds that a substantial sum is due him in connection with alterations to the yacht, which is the Mahroussa.

EVANGELIST MAY VISIT HALIFAX

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 3.—Dr. Wilbur Chapman, the noted evangelist, will be invited to hold a series of meetings in Halifax. It is thought that he will accept the invitation for October 19th. His lineup for that date is all taken up. The invitation goes from the Evangelical Alliance.
