Ordination of Francis D. McDonald, S. J.

A most impressive ceremony
took place on Monday, the 2nd inst.,
at the Chapel of the Immaculate
Conception, Montreal, where the
Right Reverend George Gauthier,
Coadjutor Bishop of Montreal, or-
dained Francis D. McDonald, of the
Society of Jesus, to the dignity of
the Holy Priesthood. The newly or-
dained priest is the youngest son
of the late Joseph McDonald and
Catherine McDonald of Saint An-
drew's Parish, in this province,
where his mother still resides on
the old homestead. He is the nep-
hew of the late Rev. Donald Fran-
cis McDonald, and brother of Dr.
Augustine A. of Souris, and Dr.
James of Somerville, Mass. Father
McDonald made his classical stud-
ies at St. Dunstan's College, where
he proved a diligent and successful
student, was appointed to the teach-
ing staff, took an active part in
all the college activities and gradu-
ated with honors in 1906. He enter-
ed the Society of Jesus in the au-
tumn of 1906, and after two years
passed in the novitiate at Sault au
Recollet, Montreal, he pursued a
two years post-graduate course in
the classics at St. Andrew-on-Hud-
son, New York. After three years
of Philosophy at the Immaculate
Conception, Montreal, he was plac-
ed on the staff of Loyola College,
returning to the Immaculate Con-
ception in 1916, where he complet-
ed his fourth year of Theology.
Among those present at the ordina-
tion were Rev. George Coffin, C. S.
S. R., Revs. Austin Bradley, S. J.,
Plus J. McLellan, S. J., Frank J.
McDonald, S. J., Rev. Brothers
Ellas and Prudent, of the Christian
Brothers, Rev. Sisters St. Athan-
asia and St. Angela, of Notre Dame
and Sister Mary Margaret, of Scot-
land, of the Sisters of St. Ann.
There were also present at the or-
dination ceremony Father McDon-
ald's mother, who in the eighty-first
year of her age, travelled all the
way from her Island home to be
present on the happy occasion, his
sister, Mrs. Archibald McDonald,
Souris, his brothers, Dr. Augustine
A. and Mrs. McDonald, Souris, and
Dr. James and Mrs. McDonald,
Somerville, Mass., Mr. and Mrs.
Heber Bambrick, Montreal, Mrs.
Mullaly, and others of the immedi-
ate relatives.

Father McDonald's many friends
in this province and elsewhere, re-
joice with him in his happy at-
tainment of the goal for which he
so well and faithfully labored, and
his good mother is receiving the
warm congratulations of her num-
erous relatives and friends on the
great happiness that has come to
her in seeing her worthy son take
his place in the ranks of the Sons
of Loyola, that distinguished Order
of Preachers and Teachers.
That Father McDonald's labors
in the Master's vineyard may be
abundantly blessed, is the wish and
prayer of his many friends in his
native Island by the sea.
