MONTREAL, April 29 (CP)—There were 97 cattle, 23 sheep, 1,156 hogs and 1,990 calves for sale on Montreal livestock markets.

Prices on calves were 25 to 50 cents higher. Hogs were firmer, and other classes of livestock steady.

The few cattle offered were mostly cows. Butcher cows ranged from \$4.50 to \$7; good cows \$6.50 up to \$8.50; medium \$5.25 to \$6.25. Canners and cutters \$3.50 to \$4.50. Common bulls \$4.50 to \$6.25.

Veal calves ranged from \$5.50 to \$8. There were no 100s. Good weaners \$7 to \$7.50 and common kinds down to \$5.50. The bulk of the veals were of common to just fair quality and were sold in mixed lots between \$6.25 to \$6.50.

Sheep ranged from \$3.50 to \$6.50, mostly \$5.50 to \$6.

Hogs were firm at \$11.75 for B-1 dressed, \$8.75 for B-1 alive fed and watered and \$8.90 off trucks delivered. Grade A sows \$1 per hog premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were from \$5.50 to \$6.50 tops \$7 live weight.

CHEDDAR CHEESE SIZE AND WEIGHT

An order of the Dairy Products Board, dated March 19 1941, ruled that in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, cheddar cheese less than fifteen inches in diameter or less than 75 pounds in weight must not be manufactured after the 31st day of March 1941, without authorization from the Board. Neither must cheddar cheese, other than white and unwaxed, be manufactured in these provinces after that date without the authorization of the Board.

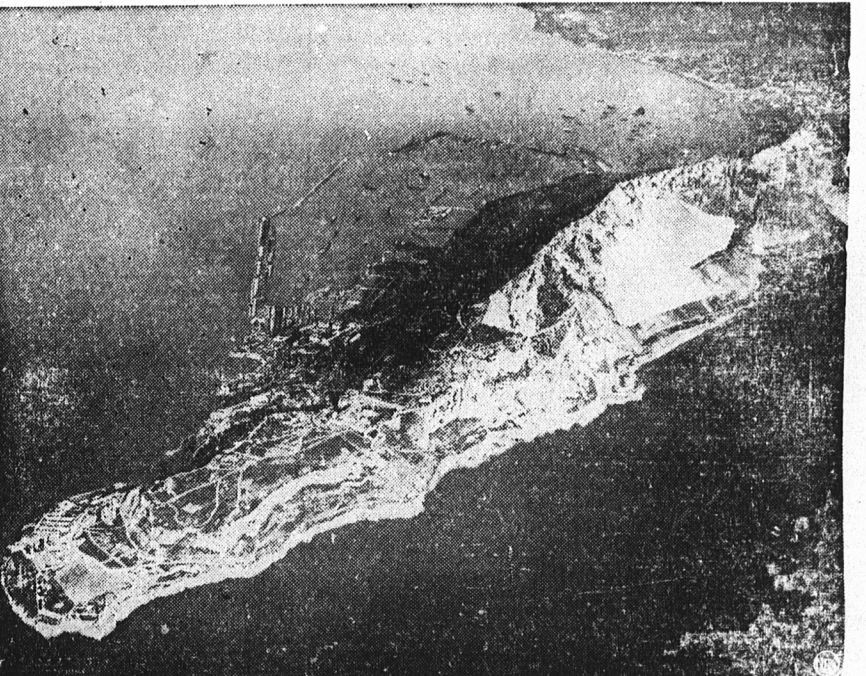

Trenching 1400 feet, thrusting 2 1/2 miles from Spain southward into the narrow strait between Europe and Africa, the Rock has long been a symbol of impregnable defense. Rock-hewn fortifications honeycomb its limestone, hiding great gun emplacements for a garrison of some 10,000 men. Guns up to 16-inch caliber cover the 15-mile strait and surrounding positions for nearly thirty miles east, west and south. From a sheer precipice guns bristle northward too, across a sandy plain and Spanish La Linea.
