GARDEN OF THE GULF.

Extracts From an Article By Olive Lee of Texas who Visited This Province Last Summer.

Charlottetown, the capital and chief city of the Island, is about three miles from the entrance and is pleasantly situated, gradually rising from the harbor front to an elevation of about fifty feet above the sea level. The streets are wide and in fair condition. Charlottetown being the Government seat, has quite a number of pretentious public buildings. The Province Building, Post-office and Court House are centrally located in Queen Square, convenient to the principal business houses.

This square is artistically laid out with neatly designed flower beds filled with choice plants, and with its handsome fountain formed a most attractive picture as we viewed it from the editorial rooms of THE GUARDIAN.

One of the best evidences of the up to dateness of this delightful little city is the number and quality of its enterprising newspapers. There is a fine morning paper, THE GUARDIAN and two evening papers, "The Patriot" and "Examiner," each publishing weekly editions, while through the enterprise and energy of Mr. Archibald

Irwin, Charlottetown has a fine literary magazine published monthly. The city is well supplied with churches—Saint Dunstan's Cathedral being one of the finest in the Provinces. Charlottetown has a number of fine institutions; two well conducted hospitals, an Insane Asylum, the Prince of Wales College and Normal School, St. Dunstan's Roman Catholic College, two convent schools, three large Public schools, a Kindergarten and School of Music and several excellent private schools.

The Lieut-Governor resides here in an old time mansion surrounded by fine shade trees; there are a number of beautiful residences, while Victoria Park, connected with the city by the Park Boulevard, contains forty-six acres and possesses many beautiful and picturesque spots. Charming drives among scenery reminding one of England, lie in every direction. From the top of the Provincial Building the view takes in the spacious harbor, the three broad rivers between which Charlottetown is built, with the fertile fields and green woods stretching away to the horizon.

PRINCE STREET LIBRARY

A Review of its Organization and the Work it is Accomplishing.

One of the most valuable aids to the work of the public school is a good library. The pupil whose only literature on any subject is the text book will not be able to secure a very extensive knowledge of the subject. In addition to the school text larger and fuller works on the subject studied are necessary that the pupil may procure an intelligent knowledge of it.

For educative purposes the library should be a part of the school outfit, so that the pupil could have the benefit of the teacher's direction in the use of the books.

Realizing the importance of the library as a factor in education, the teachers of Prince Street School, several years ago formed the nucleus of a library, to which they have been adding each year since. At present there are upwards of two hundred volumes in the library, consisting of standard work in Literature, History, Biography and Science.

The needs of every grade of pupil is considered in procuring books. The list consists of books suitable to the pupils

of the primary, intermediate and advanced classes.

Added interest is given to the History and Geography lesson when interesting books bearing on these topics are within easy reach of the pupil. The teaching of Literature in the best way can only be done when complete works of the author studied are accessible. The teaching of these and of every other branch on the course of study is greatly aided by the library.

Desirous of adding to the stock of books the teachers and pupils of this school purpose giving a unique entertainment on Friday, December 6th, afternoon and evening, in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, in the shape of a school exhibition of work done in the school—collections of Natural History objects made by the pupils and carols loaned by friends. As in the past so at this time those engaged in this laudable work will be encouraged by a liberal public patronage. Encourage the teachers and pupils in their work and the reflex action of increased efficiency in the school because of better equipment, will be felt throughout the entire community.

IRISH MEMBERS GIVEN GREAT RECEPTION.

MONTREAL, Nov. 20.—(Special)—Redmond, O'Donnell and McHugh the Irish member, arrived this morning and were given an enthusiastic welcome. Redmond held a levee at the Windsor which was attended by many Irishmen.

Redmond declined to discuss the war or attitude of the Irish toward it, but predicted that the Salisbury Government would be defeated and replaced by a coalition Government within a year and that home rule would be granted.
