Big reduction in N. B. seed potato acreage

FREDERICTON, N. B., July 29.—New Brunswick seed potato acreage for 1941 has been reduced by 3,800 acres, according to C. H. Godwin, chief of the Dominion Department of Agriculture today. With applications from growers dropping over 600 figures released last week, the 11,906 acres passed last year for a total of 12,328.
