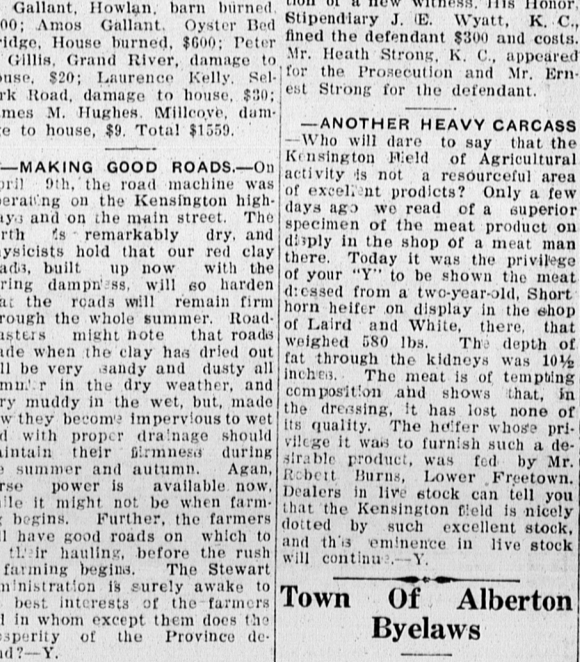

—MAKING GOOD ROADS.—On April 9th, the road machine was operating on the Kensington high-ways and on the main street. The earth is remarkably dry, and physicists hold that our red clay roads, built up now with the spring dampness, will so harden that the roads will remain firm through the whole summer. Roadmasters might note that roads made when the clay has dried out will be very sandy and dusty all summer in the dry weather, and very muddy in the wet, but, made now they become impervious to wet and with proper drainage should maintain their firmness during the summer and autumn. Again, horse power is available now, while it might not be when farming begins. Further, the farmers will have good roads on which to haul their produce, before the rush of farming begins. Town Of Alberton Byelaws

All non-resident Insurance Agents, Fire, Life, Accident and other branches of Insurance, to pay a license fee of \$10.00 annually. All resident Insurance Agents above described to pay a license fee of \$25.00 annually. All retail peddlars or salesmen to pay the sum of \$10 annually. All meat peddlars to pay the sum of \$10.00 annually. All Licenses issued under said by-laws to be and continue in force from the date of issue until the 31st day of December, following the date of such license. Moving Picture Companies to pay the sum of \$2.00 per month. Theatrical troupes or companies to pay the sum of \$3.00 per day. Non-compliance with the above by-laws, or any of them, shall render the party guilty of such non-compliance liable to a penalty of less than \$20.00, or imprisonment to not exceeding one month. 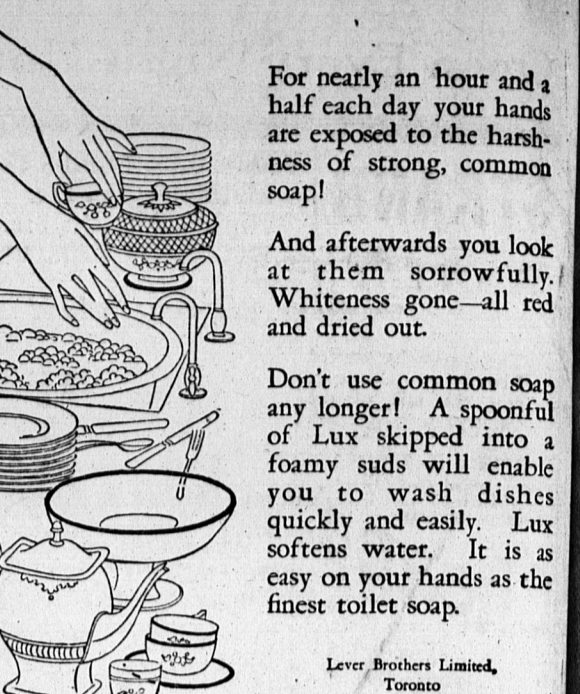
