SUCCESSFUL ISLANDER—One of our successful Island boys abroad is Mr. Lee Gamble, a son of Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Gamble, of Rose Valley, P. E. I., who, although only a young man, has made a mark for himself in the Dairy business. He worked about three years with his brother, Mr. C. E. Gamble, of the Tryon Dairying Co., where he made his start in the creamery work. On Jan. 1st, 1927, he went to Charlottetown, Ont., where he entered the Dairy Course of the Guelph Agricultural College, coming fifth in a class of forty-four students in the final exams and received first prize in a cream graders competition held there at the close of the Dairy Course, when about two hundred cream graders from Ontario and other parts of the Dominion gathered there for a convention and graders competition. This brought Mr. Gamble quite favorably to the notice of the Dairy officials from the Western Provinces, who urged him to go West and take up official cream grading work. Early in April he went to Winnipeg where he took two weeks in the Winnipeg Agricultural College to get accustomed with the methods of Western Creamery work. On May 1st he entered the Erickdale Creamery as head butter maker where he has made a good showing as may be seen by the following awards given by the different Exhibition and Creamery conventions held throughout the Western Provinces. Reserve grand championship for Manitoba at Regina; Bank of Montreal Sweepstakes at Dairy Convention in Winnipeg; Highest total score in Delaval Interprovincial in Regina; At the Winnipeg Exhibition, three firsts and four seconds; At the Regina Exhibition, one first and one second; At Central Canada, Ottawa, one first; At Royal Agricultural Fair, Toronto, one first and one second; At Vancouver Fair, one first and one second; and second prizes at Calgary and Edmonton Fairs, also third prizes at Brandon, Man., Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto; Royal Winter Fair in Toronto, and Vancouver Fair in Vancouver, B. C. This is rather a good showing for a young man just starting on his chosen career and his many friends on P. E. I. join in wishing him the best of luck.
