Premier's Pledges May Cause Split

Abolition Of Liquor Clearances Is Opposed By Quebec Bloc.

OTTAWA, Dec. 6.—Two pledges by Premier King, if implemented by legislation in the next session, may cause a rift in the solid Quebec representation. During last session the prime minister promised there would be legislation at the next session to give divorce reform to Ontario. Since the last session he had publicly indicated, and if rumor is correct, privately promised that clearances to ships with liquor cargoes for prohibition countries will be abolished.

Twice has Hon. W. B. Willoughby, Conservative leader in the senate, introduced legislation to transfer jurisdiction on Ontario divorces applications from the senate to the Ontario courts. Both times this bill has failed to be adopted in the commons, but last session the fight on divorce bills secured from the prime minister a pledge that next session there would be legislation to accomplish this brought before parliament. If this is a government measure and it scarcely can be otherwise, after the prime minister's pledge and responsibility, it will see the minister of justice aligned against the government on an important legal question, as during the debates in the commons Hon. Ernest Lapointe emphatically declared his opposition to such a change.

Statement to Press
Before the return of Hon. W. D. Euler from Europe, Premier King stated to the press it was the intention of the government next session to secure legislation to make it possible to refuse clearances to liquor-laden vessels for neutral countries. Since then it is common report he has given an even more and emphatic promise to certain advocates of this measure. Quebec members are unanimously opposed to such a measure, and notice has been served on Quebec ministers by certain Quebec members, "they won't stand for it."

It is stated that at least 50 and probably 75 per cent of the Quebec private members will oppose such government legislation. The Quebec ministers are opposed, but if the prime minister insists, it is said they will agree to the measure but much against their will and fearful of the cleavage that may follow in solid Quebec.

Although both divorce and liquor-clearance legislation may cause a rift in Quebec, it is doubtful if this will prove of much advantage to Conservatives. The real aim of that province is solidarity in its Ottawa representation, as solidarity means Quebec control of the federal house. The issue at the next election in Quebec, despite internal friction and disagreement, will be the maintenance of the "solid bloc." Economic, social and sentimental issues are and will be subordinated to solidarity.

Sun Rays For Hens

BERLIN, Dec. 6.—A new use for artificial sunlight and ultra-violet rays has been discovered in Germany, and suggests pleasant visions of fatter chickens and bigger and better eggs.
A nest of eggs was exposed to these life-giving rays for a few minutes morning and evening, with surprising results. The chicks pushed their way through with vigour and enthusiasm into the world long before the appointed time, and after a few days further treatment were strutting round the farmyard regarding their sun-rayed and under-sized fellows with ill-concealed contempt.
Even the unwelcome cockerels put on such weight that they turned the scale at nearly five pounds after four months and brought a handsome profit.
Hens which laid a valedictory egg on July 25 and retired to moult were artfully deceived by the rays into thinking that they had failed to notice the passage of time, and presented themselves in the latest autumn fashions on August 30. Since September 2 they have been laying daily.
Tightening Spark Plugs
When a spark plug is inserted in a hot cylinder, it should be drawn only tight enough to prevent leakage, otherwise when the engine is cool it will be difficult to remove the plug, owing to the contraction of the cylinder head metal. Conversely, if the engine is cold when the plug is inserted, it should be pulled tighter, or the expansion of the metal will cause leakage when the engine warms up.

Wins Thirty-Three Day Battle With The Elements

HALIFAX, Dec. 6.—The biggest freight cargo to enter the port of Halifax since the war came in last night in the holds of the disabled steamer La Belle County, of the County Line, which spent the night at Quarantine and was scheduled to berth at Pier 23, Ocean Terminal at 8 o'clock this morning.
With her bridge, smoke stack and much of her deck gear carried away by mountainous seas that poured over the craft on November 18, about three hundred miles south of Saint John's Newfoundland, as she ploughed through the terrific gales which swept the Atlantic coast, endeavouring to reach Montreal, to which port she was consigned. The crippled condition of the boat thwarted the captain at every turn, however, and after 33 days out from Antwerp, he brought the vessel into Halifax under her own power.
