Grocers Defeat Falcons By 5-1 Score

Errors Prove Big Factor In Five Inning Struggle

Getting the jump in the second inning by scoring three runs on three damaging Falcon errors Burhoe's Grocers added two more in their final turn at bat to defeat the Holy Name Club Falcons 5 to 1 last night in the third game of the playoff series to determine the team to meet the Stars for the City Baseball League title and Chester A. Campbell trophy. The losers avoided a shutout in their final turn at the plate, snaring three safe hits to drive Plus Bolger across the plate with their orphan tally. The Grocers victory gives them a decided edge in the best out of three series.

The game was another hotly contested affair with McFarlane the winning hurler, pitching a steady brand of ball throughout. He was in a tough spot in the Falcons last time at bat but a sparkling double play by Mel Diamond pulled him through with only one run being scored against him. He granted seven hits while striking out four.

Not attempting to take any credit away from the winners but George Ayers, the Falcon pitcher, certainly deserved at least a draw in his performance. The big left-hander granted but five hits while striking out thirteen batters in five innings. Certainly a performance deserving of a much better fate than a 5 to 1 beating. However, post mortems are unnecessary and tonight the Falcons are on the spot when they again take on the Grocers in the fourth game of the series, made necessary by the two draw battles.

Two Upsets In Forest Hill Tournament

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 29.—Clear and cool weather and a record, first-day crowd of 5,000 spectators scattered over the 20 turf courts of the Westside Club sent the first combined men's and women's United States singles tennis championships off to a flying start today.

Two seeded players fell by the wayside in the first round, as did three of Canada's half dozen contenders.

All told, 65 matches were played and, as though fate had a hand in it, the final encounter resulted in the outstanding battle of the day as the veteran former Spanish Davis Cup star, Manuel Alonzo, came out of the shades of the past to out-last and out-steady Berkeley Bell, seventh seeded American, in a five-set struggle, 6-4, 7-9, 6-8, 7-5, 6-1.

The only other surprise was the uphill victory scored by the unseeded Gene Mako, freshman member of the 1935 United States Davis Cup squad, over the sixth-seeded foreign entrant, Jacques Brugnon of France. Wild as a hawk in the first set, Mako snapped back into form and accounted for the French veteran in four sets, 0-6, 6-2, 7-5, 6-1.

Henri P. Emard of Montreal had the hopeless task of facing tall Frank Shields, New York star, and as was to be expected he met elimination. Scores were 6-0, 6-3, 6-1.

Laird Watt and Robert Murray, two other Montrealers in the men's division, drew first round byes.

The Canadian women competing were defeated in their first assignments. Diana Pope of London, Ont., defeated the English international, Miss Phyllis Mudford King, and went down 6-0, 6-0. Effie Bellings, Montreal, was beaten 6-1, 6-1, by Gracyn Wheeler, Santa Monica, Calif.

Jean Burritt, the Toronto veteran, defaulted to Patricia Henry of Los Angeles.

Buddy Baer Halts Doyle In First Round

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—The Californian, Jacob "Buddy" Baer, brother of the former heavyweight champion, belted out the thumping Irish Thrush, Jack Doyle, in a first round upset in the "old sod" in less than a round of a highly entertaining combat scheduled for six rounds in Madison Square Garden tonight.

The first round lasted only two minutes, 38 seconds, and in that time early headed Doyle, who really can sing, managed to get himself floored three times, once with a ringing cry of four before referee Bill Cavanaugh, a sympathetic cell himself, stopped the carnage to the tune of whistles and snatches of song from about 10,000 spectators.

Baer, whose baritone voice has rung out from vaudeville stage and over the air, used his 238 1-4 pounds to great advantage. He moved in on Doyle, anaemic at 204 by comparison, at the opening bell and never stopped punching until the husband of the beautiful motion picture actress, Judith Allen, had lost all sense of his surroundings.

In the course of the short-spasm of modest warfare, Doyle reached out and smacked Buddy on the chin a couple of times with right hands that did the youngest, but largest member of the Baer clan, no good at all.

The first time Buddy reached him, with a thudding right to the stomach, Doyle collapsed in Baer's arms, moved for adjournment immediately. He chased the trisman across the ring and smacked him to the floor under a neutral set of ropes for a count of three. Doyle pulled himself erect, tried to look unconcerned as Baer tore after him again, and collapsed once more, under the next set of ropes as a right cross and left hook boomed on his chin.

This time Doyle was only foiling when he climbed to his feet at six and tried to appear in command of the situation. His knees buckled as he tried to walk. He turned his broad, muscular back to Maxie's brother and tottered away. Buddy clipped him once before referee Cavanaugh solicitously stepped in and called things off.

Young Baer, who now has knocked over 27 opponents in 28 tries, losing only a decision to Babe Hunt, was a three to one favorite so no one was surprised except probably Doyle and Miss Allen. The crowd of 11,547 took it all good naturedly.

Arsenal Bids High For Fourth Title

LONDON—Aug. 29.—As winter sports enthusiasts prepare for the opening of the football season in England Saturday chief interest lies in Arsenal's prospects of creating a record by winning the league championship four times in succession.

The Gunners have held the leadership for the past three years, a feat performed by Huddersfield Town some 10 years ago. But the Londoners have a hard road ahead. Sheffield Wednesday, English cup holder, is a little cocky this season about its chances of leading the league and with some reason. The Yorkshiremen have built up a fine all-round side and with Sunderland, last year's runner-up, are sure to make things hot for the colorful Arsenal.

The game at Highbury Saturday between Arsenal and the powerful Sunderland squad is expected to be a classic. The Gunners will not be at full strength but have capable reserves. Frank Moss, their goalkeeper is nursing an injured shoulder and Jack Hulme, star right-winger is out of the game through a groin operation.

Another interesting match will be that between Everton and Derby County on the Toffee-makers' ground. The county has an imposing forward line including S. D. Crooks, Hugh Gallacher, J. Bowes, C. Napier and the famous "Dally" Duncan, all internationals. Everton's side includes W. R. Dean, noted centre-forward, who needs only 18 goals to equal the league record of 352 set by Steve Bloomer many years ago.

Giants Move Up As Pirates Take Measure Of Cards 5-1; Tigers Trounce Browns

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—The league leading St. Louis Cardinals succumbed to the fast-flying Pirates today as big Jim Weaver turned in one of the finest flinging jobs of his career to best the great Dizzy Dean 5-1 at Pittsburgh.

The defeat left the Cards only 1 1-2 games ahead of the second-place Giants, who defeated Brooklyn, and two in front of Chicago's Cubs, who trimmed Boston. It was Pittsburgh's eighth straight victory and left the Bucs only seven games away from the leaders.

Weaver outpitched Dean with a big margin to spare. He gave only seven hits, one a triple by Joe Medwick in the fourth which led to the only Cardinal run. He struck out eight of the clouting Red Birds, getting three of them on strikes in the third. Dean, owner of 22 triumphs this season, was touched for 10 hits as he dropped his eighth game. It was the third decision he had lost to the Bucs.

Gain Full Game

The Cubs gained a full game in their drive for the National League pennant by bowling over the cellar-dwelling Braves 8-2 at Boston in the final game of their eastern tour.

Big Bill Lee, league-leading hurler, pitched seven-hit ball for his season's 15th victory while his mates belted Fred Frankhouse, Danny MacFayden and Huck Betts for 15 blows. Frank Demaree led the assault with a double and three singles.

The Giants shook off their losing spell at Brooklyn to beat the Dodgers 7-5. After four straight losses, the Terrymen out loose with 15 hits against a trio of Brooklyn pitchers while Clyde Castleman, after surviving a bad hot inning rallied to go the full route and gain his 12th victory of the season.

Dick Bartell led the New York attack with his 12th home run of the year and three singles.

Sopwith To Build New Challenger

PORTSMOUTH, England, Aug. 29.—T. O. M. Sopwith has definitely decided to build a new challenger for the America's Cup.

The new craft, to be known as "Endeavour II," is expected to be ready for launching in May of next year. It will be built at the Nicholson Yard in Gosport. The hull will weigh about 164 tons, with a waterline of 87 feet and a sail area of 7,560 square feet—the same as the first Endeavour with which Sopwith made his losing bid for the cup last year. The keel will be lead and weigh about 86 tons. Whether the hull will be steel or bronze alloy has not yet been determined.

The Boston sloop Yankee will complete its racing season tomorrow at Dartmouth and then will be laid up for the winter at Gosport where it will be placed in readiness for the 1936 British season.
