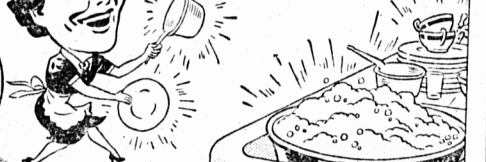

There was a time when men painted and powdered their faces; adorned themselves in gay brocades, veils, jaces; diked themselves out in embroideries and jewels and wore their hair ravishing curls. But somehow, through chicanery and cunning, women stole all of their fine feathers from them and made these aids to beauty their perquisites. And for a long time the male of the species has been reduced to clothing himself in drab tubular garments and being as homely as God made him. Now, however, it seems that men have rebelled at letting women monopolize the beauty shops and have set about recovering some of their lost gewgaws. ### POMPADOUR RETURNS

Pompadours are here. We heard tiny, almost imperceptible whispers and then suddenly awakened one morning to find they are here to stay. It is difficult to say. But since military is being designed to accommodate the hair, they are here to stay. Pompadours are making it hard and harder for us to stay away from their doors because only an operator can give that final touch to a pompadour. Some home-combed ones remind one of the little sausages. But on to better things like the new hats, for instance.

Both large and small hats are made to emphasize the pompadour. Many have an identical line under the brim to keep the pompadour from becoming a band. Most new hats have a long back line and this is necessitated by showing the hair in front. The line is often achieved by the use of a close-fitting cap or a knit-weave in wool that holds the hair firmly on the head. Long bed-linen and drapery go hand in hand with the simple fabrics such as velvets, satins, fleeces and jerseys that are showing trend to perfection in manipulation. There is much drapery about these days, not merely confined to turbans.

The early fall colors will specialize in deep earthy tones of brown, running the gamut from gray-brown to deep earth brown. Gray and brown are used together and no longer are the bright colors used for millinery. The reds are more coppery than flamboyant, and blues are dulled to most becoming shades.

### FASHION FLASHES

Brass buttons, a puffed sleeve on a cuff like a man's shirt, the pockets on the chest only — these are features of a soft, woolen suit to solve the problem of a cool day. Another feature, and another good point for the two-piece fall frock, is the moderate width of the skirt.

Twoed suit details include colored pipings, pouch pockets slotted on skirt belts, the use of border sweeds with the border forming a broad stripe at the side of the skirt, or at yoke and waistbands on dresses, or collars and pockets on jackets.

Transparent yokes and ruffled elbow sleeves are featured of slinky daytime length cocktail frocks with slight fullness at the back of the skirt. They are mostly developed in silk serge, fine woolen, or heavy crepe. The last is sponsored for slender half-sleeved figure-clinging dinner frocks with simple, slender and ultra square necklines or wide side-to-side oval necklines.

### CORNER STAIRS NEED AMPLE FOOT SPACE

The plans of a house may call for a stairway with a corner. Such a feature may be made safe if the corner stairs are set in a 90-degree turn, and that these allow for ample foot space. To divide the turn into three steps makes for unsafe hazard.

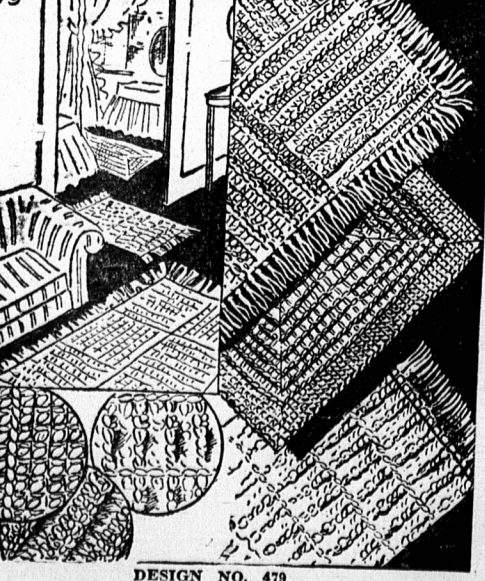
