## New Infection In Lymphatic System

CHICAGO, Oct. 28—A new cause of infection, discovered in a little-known "wonderland" of the human body, the network of fine, hollow threads known as the lymphatic system which is a bulwark against external disease attack, was reported to the American College of Surgeons today.  
A straw-colored fluid, lymph, flows in the threads. When the flow is blocked, it was shown by Cecil K. Drinker, M. D., of Harvard School of Public Health, streptococci enter the body en masse, streptococci cause blood poisoning and other diseases.  
The discovery, he said, caused "astonishment." Dogs usually immune to streptococci had a dozen successive streptococcal infections after lymph interference. The discovery is important to surgeons because their knives may interfere with the lymph system.  
After such interference, Dr. Drinker said, rigid care must be taken not to "permit" even the slightest scratch of the skin where the lymph is affected.  
Only streptococci, he said, have yet been found to attack. But he believed other infections may be able to start.  
Dr. Drinker and associates were able to trace the maze of the lymph "wonderland" by giving this network an attack or silicosis, the dust lung disease common in the mining industry. This gave the most complete pictures yet known of the lymph guardians at work.  
All through the tissues near the skin these threads pick up foreign particles and germs. These "emblems" come to the lymph both from outside the body and from the blood stream. Along with the "emblems" kicked out by the blood, come proteins, valuable to life.

The flowing lymph carries them all to "nodes", where the particles and germs are filtered out. The lymph continues on, bearing the proteins back to the blood.

## Tickle Brain To Save Life

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Oct. 28—A new method of saving lives on the operating table by tickling the brain with weak electricity was suggested today at the closing session of the National Academy of Science's fall meeting.  
Dr. W. K. Smith of the University of Rochester told the academy members that he had found in experiments with monkeys, cats, and dogs very definite areas in the cerebral cortex, or covering of the brain, which stimulated and retarded breathing but did not stop it.  
These areas do not in themselves control breathing, he added, but seem to act in harmony with the area deep in the hind brain which does control respiration.  
Slight manipulation of the areas in the cortex, however, produced either a quickening or a slowing of breathing according to which one was touched. When the nerve fibres running from the areas were cut these responses disappeared but could be produced again by stimulating the cut ends of the nerves with weak electricity, Dr. Smith said.  
These stimulating areas have not been located exactly in man, he added, but probably lie on both sides about midway back on the cerebral cortex.  
"Since some brain operations are unsuccessful because the patient stops breathing during it, the University of Rochester neurologist said, it should be possible, since the nerve is exposed anyway, to tickle the nerve endings which speed up breathing with electricity and possibly bring the patient back from imminent death."

## OFF SEASON BLOOMS SPROUTED BY LILY

CALGARY, Oct. 28—The Ottawa horticulturist who grows roses in the winter has a rival in Mrs. Mary Warren of Calgary. She grows Easter lilies that bloom in the fall.  
In the Indian summer of September, she reported, an Easter lily which bloomed on schedule last spring, shot forth a second waxy-white group of blooms.

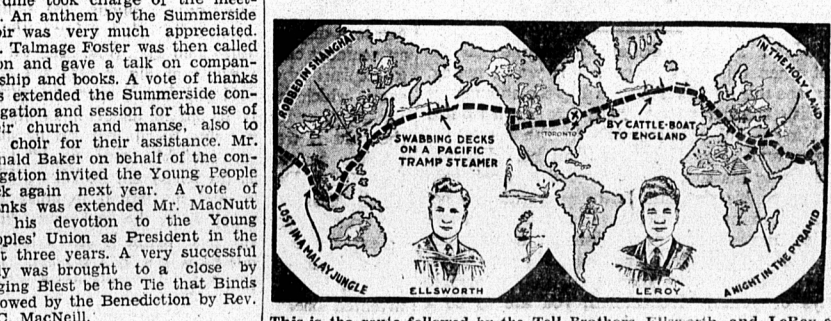
