TWO ISLANDERS.—Two Maritime Province men went down to defeat in the Penitentiary, B. C., town elections held last month. They were G. A. B. Macdonald, who had been Reeve of the town for two years and was a candidate for re-election. The other, D. S. Riordan, who had been councillor for the past two years, and was also seeking re-election. The Editor of the Penitentiary Herald wrote this in reference to Mr. Macdonald: "Frankly we are sorry to see G. A. B. Macdonald defeated. Tribute To Dr. Clarence McKinnon

(Halifax Herald)

I wonder if the people of Halifax fully realize that for many years a truly great man has lived in their midst in the person of Dr. Clarence MacKinnon?

A curious custom in this world is that of saying all good things about a man after he is dead, when he can no longer hear them and, in a revolution, is unconscious of them. This is not as it should be. Appreciation should be given to a man while he is alive.

This tribute is paid to one who has meant much to the city in which he lives. If this were a biographical sketch of Dr. MacKinnon it would be necessary to mention where he was born, where he was educated and many other facts concerning his life. It is merely the appreciation of a commoner for a great man.

Dr. MacKinnon has the most winning personality and possesses unusual gifts and an exceptional grace, united to great kindness of heart. Many men have been highly educated, but their education has been of little or no benefit to anyone but themselves.

Dr. MacKinnon, on the contrary, has shared his learning with his fellow men. And not only has he given lavishly of his knowledge, but also of his beautiful thoughts, and his conceptions of truth. Added to all, he has a vein of exquisite humor, distinctive and captivating.

All these have been bestowed with a grace and eloquence which have made them irresistible. Dr. MacKinnon possesses that rare gift—generosity—and hearing him is like listening to wonderful music or looking upon some beautiful picture. His rare gifts have not been confined to educational work with in college walls, but have even been at the command of the people at large, both at home and abroad.

Dr. MacKinnon is, and has been for years, Principal of Pine Hill Divinity Hall. He has left his impress upon hundreds of young men who have gone forth into the world and in their turn have become leaders among men. His influence here will never die, but goes on and on in ever increasing measure.

But we who admire Dr. MacKinnon, never admitted him more than when, in his country's hour of need, he laid aside his professional robes and donned the uniform of his country and went forth with thousands of her sons to war. To him, it was no adventure, but the call of duty; the opportunity of the moment for service—Preacher, Professor, Principal, but Patriot, above all. All his learning, all his gifts, were but as offerings to be used in his country's service. One more unwarlike in character or meek it would be hard to imagine and amid the cruel carnage of war and horrors of suffering, his benign and gentle presence was a benediction among the men.

In the fierce strife between employer and employee in the coal region of our province, Dr. MacKinnon was unanimously chosen more than once as a member of an Arbitration Board. And what may be considered the greater part of that compliment is that, although acceptable to the officials, he was the choice of the men and in that struggle between Capital and Labor, Dr. MacKinnon represented Labor.

In Halifax city, whatever meeting is called for the good of the people, Dr. MacKinnon is there, and his voice is always raised on the side of right.

There is much more that could and should be written of Dr. MacKinnon, but it must be left to the pen of the collegiate scribe who knows more details of Dr. MacKinnon's life. This is merely the heartfelt tribute of ONE OF THE COMMONWEALTH
