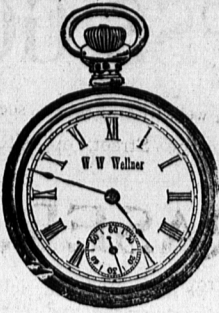

A party of distinguished members of the Knights of Columbus in Massachusetts are in the city and are being warmly welcomed by members of St. John council, particularly as in the party are some of the degree team who instituted the St. John council last November. They are on the way to Charlottetown (P. E. I.), where they will officiate at the conferring of the third degree upon a number of candidates this evening. The party is made up of S. J. Nevins, district deputy of Beaumont; John A. McKenna, of Winthrop; Thomas C. Welch, of Winthrop; Richard D. Barrett, of Everett, and Edward O'Hara, of Charlottetown. The visitors arrived on the steamer Calvin Austin last evening and on the boat were met by Dr. M. J. Kelly, of Watertown (Mass.), who is also a knight and will join in the ceremonies in Charlottetown. The party made head quarters at the Dufferin Hotel last evening, where they were called upon by local knights and were very heartily welcomed. They will leave early this morning for Charlottetown. The return to St. John will be made Thursday evening.

Mr. Nevins, who will preside at the conferring of the degree, has been a knight for a number of years and has risen to a leading position in the order. He is very popular not only at home but throughout his state and elsewhere where he has visited councils. He is now one of the state deputies for Massachusetts.

Mr. McKenna has been a K C for more than a decade and has done much to further the work of the order, for his connection with it has been that of a deeply interested, active member and officer. He has held a number of important posts.

Mr. Welch is grand knight of Winthrop council and has been for some years an efficient member of this degree team. He made many friends while here last year and his genial presence is welcomed again.
