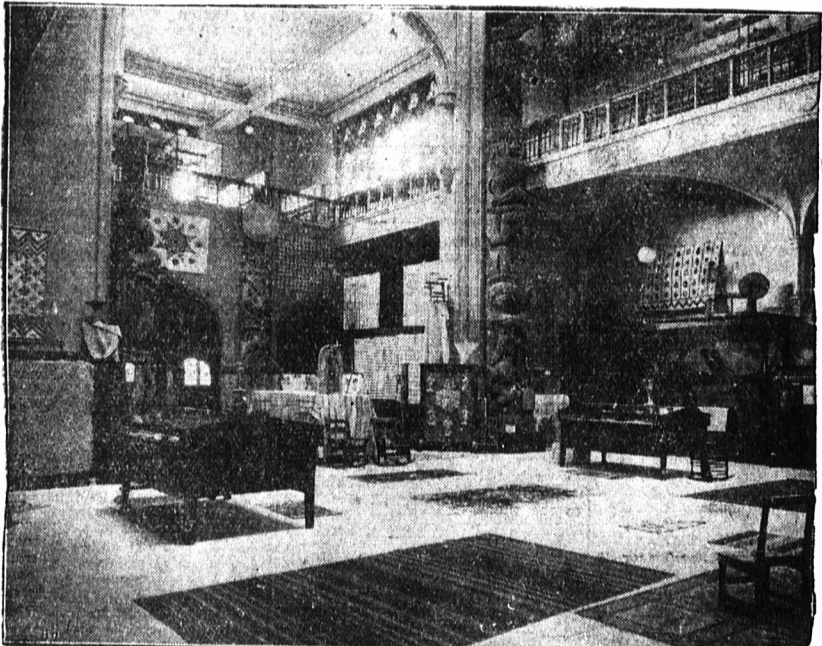

Educationalist Dies in Montreal

MONTREAL, Oct. 19—Scholar of international repute and author of many mathematical treatises, Dr. Daniel Alexander Murray, 72, former chairman of the Department of Mathematics, McGill University, died here today after a lengthy illness. He was a native of Scotsburn, Pictou County, N. S.

His first appointment was to the staff of John Hopkins University, Baltimore. Later he was professor of mathematics at New York University and, just before his appointment to McGill in 1907 was a member of the faculty of his alma mater—Dalhousie University. He was connected with McGill for 23 years serving as professor and chairman of the department of mathematics.

He took an active participation in church affairs and was a leading member of the council of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

He is survived by his widow, formerly Muriel Malloch, daughter of Dr. W. B. Malloch, of Perth, Ont., and Moose Factory, Hudson Bay, and one son, Angus Murray.

Dr. Murray "was truly representative of certain precious qualities which are markedly associated with the Maritime Provinces," stated Dr. A. S. Eve, dean of the faculty of graduate studies and research, McGill, in a tribute to his friend and associate of many years. He was respected and loved, especially unable to rally.

King Honors Matthew Lynch

HALIFAX, Oct. 19—For 30 years Matthew Lynch, bronzed veteran, tended the McNab's Island light-house, guiding ships in and out of Halifax harbor. Tonight His Majesty the King honored him for his long record of "durable service, when he was presented with an Imperial long service medal.

During the world war, the light Matthew Lynch tended had tremendous import to the Empire. Its steady stream, in fine weather and foul, guided warships and transports safely past treacherous shoals.

The medal which was received for presentation by Felix P. Quinn, member of the Federal Parliament for Halifax, was sent from Ottawa by Finance Minister E. N. Rhodes who in a letter congratulated the veteran light-keeper on his faithful performance of duty. Mr. Quinn made the presentation tonight.

Among those in the party were J. Fred Fraser, former provincial secretary in the Nova Scotia Legislature; Senator W. H. Dennis, J. A. Walker, K. C., Dr. A. McD. Morton, and C. H. Hesterman, agent for the Department of Marine.

Bandits Scourge Brazilian Towns

RECIFE, Brazil, Oct. 21—A former lieutenant of the barbaric Lampaeo is rapidly becoming more terrible than his aging master in the eyes of the populace in the interior. The new bandit terror is called Corisco, which means lightning. Lampaeo means lamp post.

Rumor has it that Corisco, who raids fazendas and towns at the head of a band of 30 mounted men and two women, always hangs the victims of his raids.

A more trustworthy report of the robber's sallies in the interior of the State of Pernambuco is that he frequents highways, forces automobiles to stop and beat the occupants before robbing them.

One half-breed story about Corisco is that when he catches a soldier in uniform he pulls his victim's tongue out with his bare hands, clamps it on the dying man's neck and exclaims, "another trooper now wears a necktie."

Lampaeo himself recently emerged from his forest retreat to terrorize the northeastern section of the country. Early in September he was reported encamped near Aguas Bellas, 186 miles from Recife. Newspapers reflected the terror of the people. One newspaper said editorially: "Emergency measures must be taken to preserve the Pernambuco sectors from the tremendous peril."
