Greyhound Tracks Run By Women

LONDON, August 23—The 200 greyhounds belonging to the Wandsworth Greyhound stadium (one of the largest greyhound racing tracks in London), are now trained, groomed and fed by women.

They have just taken over the care of the dogs from men and

have formed the first greyhound kennels in this country to be run exclusively by women.

The staff consists of six expert trainers and 20 assistants. They are all young and have each had a thorough training in the care of dogs. The head trainer, Miss Hunter, was until recently a government investigator into the causes of distemper in dogs.

Mr. S. E. Parkes, a director of the stadium, says: "I decided to staff my kennels with girls because I believe they are better at this job than men. They look upon it as a new career and are tremendously keen on the work."

It will be interesting to see how the dogs shape after several months of this new regime.
