FIREMEN ANSWER CALLS.—Charlottetown firemen answered two alarms Saturday. The first, at from Park street, on the edge of the City near the Provincial Exhibition Grounds. There was no damage. The second was from the residence of Mr. William McEachern, Bishop's Alley, where what firemen described as a "shotgun wiring" caused slight damage. This fire was 4 p. m.

INQUEST ADJOURNED.—Scheduled to be held Saturday, an inquest into the death of Mrs. Bert Mullally of Souris was adjourned for one week. According to Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Mr. Bert Mullally was cleaning a shotgun in the kitchen of his home last Friday and the weapon was discharged accidentally. Shot in the stomach, Mrs. Mullally, 22, died before a physician arrived.

FUNERAL YESTERDAY.—The funeral of the late Charles E. Hughes was held from the residence of his son George Hughes at Brackley Point, Saturday afternoon, where services were conducted by Rev. LARGE SILVER FOX PELT SHIPMENT.—The Toronto Evening Telegram of April 27 carried a photograph of the largest shipment of silver fox pelts ever to leave Canada, sold recently to a large New York coat and suit manufacturer. The shipment nearly seventeen hundred skins, came originally from the ranch of McLaughlin and MacKinnon, Silver Fox Farm Ltd., Charlottetown. The skins have a retail value of approximately \$100,000 it is well known firm, Holt-Renfrew & Company bought the skins here and made the shipment to the United States.

UNSEASONABLE STORM.—An unseasonable storm which blew up from the north east yesterday covered the Province with four inches of snow by nightfall to roll up the heaviest precipitation of snow in the Province since 1914, according to weather records at the Charlottetown Experimental Station. Total snow fall in April this year was 22.9 inches as compared with 24.5 inches of snow fall in 1914. Next nearest year was 1928 with 18.2 inches. Yesterday's storm was accompanied by a 26-per-mile-an-hour wind. Temperature dropped from 38 degrees above zero in the morning to 31 above zero at 8 o'clock last night. Roads closed to motor traffic were not closed to motor traffic by the storm, unless as was the case with muddy dirt roads, they had previously been almost impassable due to mud. But not a few motorists came to grief when they attempted to negotiate the highways, covered with four inches of slippery snow that turned to ice under the wheels of cars. Along many of the roads vehicles were in the dirt every few miles but no one was reported injured from any of the accidents.

Mr Nelson Rattenbury, City, Dies

Mr. Nelson Rattenbury, 89-year-old Charlottetown businessman, died in hospital here Saturday. He was at work in his office daily up until his illness six weeks ago.

Mr. Rattenbury possessed a remarkable physique and wonderful vitality and had enjoyed robust health during his long life until about six weeks ago when he became ill and was taken to Prince Edward Island Hospital. He had apparently recovered when returned to his home, but about a week later he took a relapse and since then he gradually grew weaker until he quietly passed away early Saturday morning.

He was born at Rattenbury Road in Lunenburg when a youth of 18 he entered the employ of Carvell Bros., Charlottetown, and was for a time their travelling salesman. Then he began business on his own account as a wholesale grocer, steamship agent and dealer in produce.

He later took as partner the late Parker Carvell and the late J.A. Messers. The firm being known as Carvell, Rattenbury and Messers. When Mr. Carvell and Mr. Messers retired, the firm of N. Rattenbury Limited was formed and he continued that name up to the present day.

The late Mr. Rattenbury, for years, was one of the most active and influential members of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, having been President on a number of occasions. In recognition of his valued services he was made a life member.

He was a director of the Canadian National Railways for three years, retiring in 1931.

Mr. Rattenbury was a member of Trinity United Church, and of the First Methodist Church before the Union.

During his career Mr. Rattenbury made a host of friends by his kindness and sympathy, and by his death a notable link between the past and the present has been severed.

His family of 13, two sons and five daughters survive. Arnold and John are associated with the family business while the daughters are Mrs. Hary Winchester, Charlottetown; Mrs. Frank Dawson, Vancouver (B.C.); Mrs. M. K. Charman, Edmonton; Mrs. E. M. George Read, Read's Corner, P.E.I.; and Mrs. R. Caldwell, Montreal.

Mr. Rattenbury's wife, the former Martha Pearson, predeceased him a year ago.

To his sons and daughters, who mourn the loss of a devoted and kind father, the Guardian in common with a very wide circle of friends its deep and respectful sympathy.
