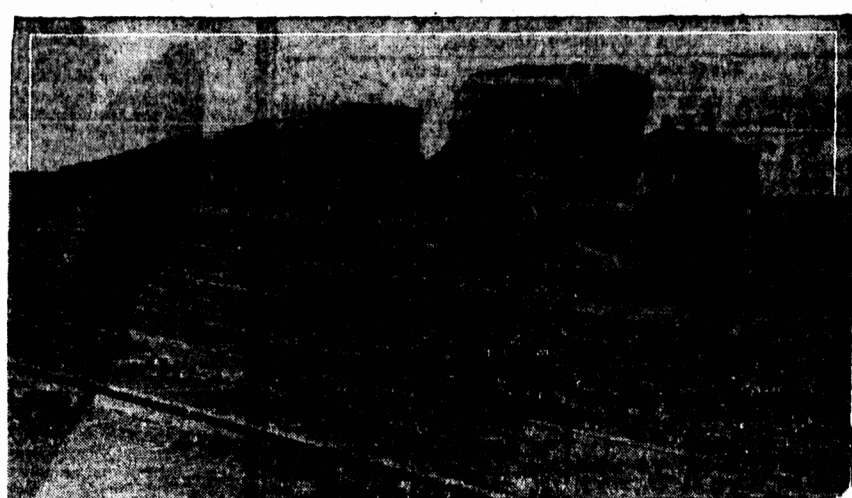

"Today is Circus Day!" This is the day when children of all ages, from youngsters to oldsters, will welcome the arrival here of the first Big circus of the season—the epochal event they have been eagerly waiting for—and today the world famous Sparks Circus—now over fifty years old—returns to the scene of its former triumphs to stage two performances, afternoon and night at 2.30 P.M. and at 8.30 P.M., the location being announced as the Exhibition Grounds.

The title "Sparks Circus" has always been a guarantee of a big, clean circus, in three rings and elevated stages, and with a galaxy of international acrobats and circus stars including the famous Joe Hodgini troupe of European bare-back riders; the Acevedo troupe of Mexico high wire artists and jugglers; the Candilla Sisters from Argentina; the Reynosa from Brazil; the Sparks herd of performing elephants; Liberty horses, leaping greyhounds, dogs, ponies, monkeys and Swiss goats.

And of course there will be a troupe of funny clowns including Ernie Burch, famous tramp impersonator, and Elmer Lindquist, known as "Moe Too" to thousands of circus patrons.

This year's Sparks Circus is enhanced with a large menagerie and traveling zoological exhibit with open cages of lions, tigers, leopards, jaguars, and other wild animals from the jungles. And the Side Show and World's Museum will be an added attraction before and after the big show program.

height. Like the observers in Sherbrooke, Mr. Clark reported the object left a vapor trail which did not remain long.
