IN MEMORIAM

THE LATE JAMES BEARSTO, M. D.

Many friends of Dr. James Bearsto have heard with emotion of his death at Winnipeg, on February 9th, at the age of 83 years. Most of his contemporaries have passed away, but to many of the younger generation he is a grateful memory, while to hundreds of others to whom he was personally unknown, his name is a household word, especially in the Western part of this Province.

James Bearsto was born at Malpeque in 1845, the son of James Bearsto, a prominent resident being farmer, miller and merchant combined. His mother was Mary Keir, daughter of the Rev. John Keir, D. D., Minister of Princeton and first Professor of Theology in what came to be the Presbyterian College, (Pine Hill), Halifax. At 27 years of age he graduated from Bellevue College, New York City, and he began the practice of his profession at Alberton.

He was first married to Miss Nellie Wiggins of Alberton and four children were born to them, Nettie, widow of Colin King, Lakeville, N. B., now a teacher in Winnipeg; May, at home, in Winnipeg; Cecil, who died quite early, and Gerald, farmer and engineer of Northgate, Manitoba, of the progressive young citizens of that Province, a leader in the Church and State, who has been invited more than once to become a candidate for legislative honours. After the death of his wife, Dr. Bearsto took up practice at Lakeville, Carleton Co., N. B.; his brother, Rev. J. K. Bearsto being minister there.

MRS. JULIA H. CHANDLER

The funeral of the late Mrs. Julia Chandler took place yesterday (Sunday) afternoon.

The service in Trinity United Church conducted by Rev. E. H. Ramsay, D.D., was very largely attended. Two favorite hymns "Peace, Perfect Peace" and "The Sands of Time are Sinking" were sung. The burial conducted by Mr. N. D. MacLean, Mortician, was in the People's Cemetery.

Bravely she carried on, bringing up three fine boys, Edward, Gordon and Sayre, of whom she was justly proud.


