WRONG MAN HELD.

NEW YORK, August 25.—The belief of Sheriff Cudapeck, of Pike County, Pennsylvania, that he had won the \$2,500 reward offered for the capture of "Gyp the Blood" and the hope of the authorities here that the fugitive really had been caught, were simultaneously blasted by detectives of the district attorney's office, who visited Milford, Pennsylvania, today and failed to identify the prisoner as the man wanted.

The man was released and the ripple of interest which the report caused had subsided tonight, leaving the whereabouts of "Gyp" and "Lettie Louis," both of whom are indicted as gun men in the Rosenthal murder, as much of a mystery as ever.

IMPRISONED IN CAISSON.

PEORIA, Ill., August 24.—After having been imprisoned for twenty-five hours at the bottom of a thirty-five foot caisson beneath the surface of the Illinois river in excavations being made for a new railway bridge near Peoria, Ill., F. J. Schmidt was hauled to the surface with a derrick last night and expired within five minutes.

Thursday evening at five o'clock Schmidt, with three fellow workmen, started to leave the bottom of the caisson, where they had been working under compressed air. His companions reached the surface, but before he could get out, the caisson sank into quick sand, pinning his legs beneath it as it went down. He was buried in the quick sand up to his neck and was held by the tremendous weight of the great steel tube.

Scores of rescuers, working in shifts which changed every few minutes, dug frantically for hours to get him out. All Thursday night and all of Friday they dug at the shifting earth. Schmidt was given nourishment, at times chatted with his rescuers, and he smoked a cigarette.

He apparently suffered no pain till workmen attempted to haul him from under the great caisson. Then he shrieked with pain. Yesterday afternoon it was decided to use a derrick. Opium was administered by a physician and a rope attached to Schmidt. On a signal to haul away his limp body was torn from its trap and hauled to the surface. He died without regaining consciousness. Both legs were terribly crushed and lacerated, and several ribs were broken.

PEKIN, August 25.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the ex-provisional president of China, who left Shanghai, August 19, with the avowed intention of endeavoring to conciliate the rival political factions, arrived here this morning. He was given a magnificent reception, rivaling that of the return to the capital of Yuan Shi Kai.

The national assembly did not conduct any business yesterday owing to the small attendance of the members and consequently the impeachment of President Yuan Shi Kai, in regard to the execution of General Chang Chen Wu and several other southern generals, has collapsed for the time being. The Mongolians who recently attacked the city of Tao Nan, Manchuria, have retreated, but they maintain an aggressive attitude. At a meeting of the cabinet last night, the question of despatching an expedition to inner Mongolia was discussed, but it was decided to restrict military measures for the present to prevent raids and looting for which purpose the Manchurian forces were considered ample.
