Speaking on the Draft Address in the Legislature on March 26th, Mr. H. D. McLean, Conservative member for the First District of Kings, said:

showing that Japan has done for their fisheries. It should be of interest to the hon. members here, not that this House can take any action with respect to our fisheries, but that we may all know what has been done in other countries.

I do not wish to make this a political matter at all. I am quite free to say that the Fishery interests have been neglected at Ottawa by both Conservative and Liberal Governments. While I say that, I remember that a Conservative Government came in in 1911, and had the Great War on their hands in 1914, and they had very little time to deal with the matter.

I would like to say a word now on the crabs and lobster industry in Japan. Before doing so I shall refer to an article by Mr. Maurice Holland, Director of the Division of Engineering and Industrial Research of the National Research Council of the United States, which gives his impressions of modern Japan, particularly those that relate to her fisheries.

The outstanding illustration of an industry that developed under the influence of Japanese science by Japanese technicians is the fisheries industry. Fisheries technology is more highly developed in Japan than in any other country, and fish and fish products are playing an increasingly important part in the economic life of the people.

of importance and value to the whole group. The Crab Fishing Industry. The hon. member from Summerside has mentioned the crab industry. I wish to show how it started and its possibilities at the present time, and how it was assisted by the Japanese Government.

I might point out that the Japanese Government did not stop with the assistance they gave along the line of improving the pack. They aided very materially in the advertising campaign in the United States before these fish were exported, and as a result of that the fish were readily taken up.

There was a general business boom in 1908 which helped along the industry as it developed. I might say that up to that time the canning of crabs was done altogether on shore. But in 1916 the Japanese Government through this College of Fisheries, sent out a small steamer and experimented with catching and packing the crabs at sea.

During the period when canning was prosecuted only on the shore, the greatest pack of canned crab put up in any one year was 170,000 cases, whereas last year, including the output of the steamer or floating canneries, the pack was 400,000 cases, and there is no knowing what the quantity may be this year.

averaged on the lot. Sometimes by finding special markets for our best product we can get a higher price for these. Then the poorer grades creep in with lower prices, the goods become mixed and eventually the market is demoralized, because of the lack of uniformity in quality, and the result is that you have to accept lower prices for the higher quality article. It should be the duty of the Government to see that all packs conformed to certain high standard before they are placed on the market.

Possibilities in Herring Fishery.

We have here, as the hon. member from Morel said in his speech on the Address, a large quantity of herring. These fish at the present time are not made very much use of. They are used for bait particularly, and, as somebody mentioned, a great many are used for feeding foxes. I think if the Government undertook to deal with the herring fishery they could evolve some means of taking them to greater use. The fish are certainly suitable for food, and surely some method could be found whereby they could be put up profitably and an industry created or made larger along that line.

We have, also, at the present time, and for some years past, been visited by a pest of the fisheries—the dogfish. Some years ago the Government did establish dogfish reduction works at one or two points in Nova Scotia. These stations are not in operation today, but I think that something might be done, if the matter were taken in hand properly by the Government and a College established such as they have in Japan, where experiments might be carried on continuously along somewhat similar lines.
