C.W.L. Convention Opens At S' Side

The 26th annual diocesan convention of the Catholic Women's League of P.E.I. opened last evening in St. Paul's Hall Summerside. There was a very large attendance of delegates and visitors. Mrs. Wm. J. Sullivan, President of the Summerside sub-division presided and brought greetings to the delegates in a few well chosen remarks. On the program were tastefully decorated with flowers and plants were Rt. Rev. Msgr. G. J. McLellan, V.G., Rev. Thomas Butler, Mayor W. J. Lidstone, Mrs. Adrian MacInnis, Souris, President and Mrs. H. P. Hynes, Montague, Executive Secretary. The program opened with "Of Canoe and by the orchestra composed of Mrs. Marie Gaudet and Mr. Roy Ahearne. Mrs. Sullivan in her remarks welcoming the delegates referred to the last time that the convention was held in Summerside seven years ago and although we are now under the shadow of war," she expressed the wish that the convention would be successful and receive the blessing of Divine Guidance and that the delegates would be away with them pleasant memories of their visit.

Msgr. McLellan Rt. Rev. Msgr. G. J. McLellan was then called upon to address the gathering.

In a forceful address Msgr. McLellan expressed his pleasure at being present and congratulated members of the Catholic Women's League on the splendid contribution they have made in the war effort. Their work is a patriotic one and comes from the notion of patriotism. The urge women have to do these things comes from that love of home which is dearest in every woman's heart. The women of the C.W.L. have realized that "our homes and all that are in danger of being destroyed," he said. "We have not yet suffered or experienced the dreadful trials of actual warfare but we know that there are forces abroad in the world which would trample down everything we hold dear and make religion and the home subservient to the state. The women of the C.W.L. have realized that they themselves to work so that these forces may be overcome."

They have a wide vision and deep sympathy of the many trials that beset the nations of democracy and have rallied to the call so that the freedom of man to worship God according to the dictates of his conscience may be preserved. He called upon the women to continue to sacrifice so that they might go forward in the noble work they are doing and continue to work together for a victorious peace.

Mayor Lidstone Mayor Lidstone in a short speech extended a civic welcome to the delegates and congratulated them on the good work they have accomplished for the armed forces and for social service. He would like to see the work of the C.W.L. more appreciated and in conclusion expressed the hope that their stay in Summerside would be a pleasant and profitable one.

ICE CREAM SCARCE—Ice cream is at a premium in Charlottetown at present with little prospect of improvement until the end of this month. The majority of retailers were completely out of the delicacy yesterday but some of them expect to get a few gallons in the next few days. The dealers who were fortunate to have a small quantity on hand were dishing it out on a sort of rationing system, allowing a cone or so to each person. The shortage is due to wartime regulations which provide for spreading the supply over three-month periods. Hot weather in August resulted in a higher consumption which caused rapid depletion in the amount allowed to each dealer.

PREVENT SERIOUS FIRE—What might have developed into a serious fire was prevented last night by the speedy action of the members of the Charlottetown Yacht Club. Their prompt action Slaver's Foundry on the waterfront saved it and surrounding buildings from probable destruction. While two of them, armed with buckets of water, kept the flames which they noticed about 9.30 p.m. spreading, a third rushed to neighborhood grocer and telephone in the alarm. This message summoned the firemen to finish the job. Damage was slight.
