

IMPORTANT READING MATTER SELECTED FROM THIS WEEK'S NEWS FOR THE GUARDIAN'S SATURDAY SUBSCRIBERS

SUMMERSIDE, June 11—In the Supreme Court at Summerside this morning the case of the King versus James Cahill was taken up when court resumed before the Chief Justice and a jury, and the following witnesses were examined for the prosecution:

James H. Grady, A. C. Rogers, W. B. McNeill, Frank Gallant and Leonard Gallant.

The evidence of the above witnesses occupied the attention of the court till the adjournment for dinner. On resuming after dinner Mr. Saunders, who was acting for the prisoner, asked leave of the court to withdraw the plea of the prisoner of not guilty, and substitute the one of guilty, which the court allowed, the jury being instructed to bring in a verdict of guilty without leaving the box.

The case against Benj. Souler on the same charge was then taken up with a new jury in charge. In this case the following witnesses for the Crown were examined:

James H. Grady, Malcolm Steele and James Cahill, while the prisoner took the stand in his own defence. After the addresses to the jury by Mr. Saunders for the defence, the Attorney-General for the Crown and the Chief Justice, the jury returned at 5 o'clock and after being out 40 minutes returned with a verdict of not guilty, and upon motion of Mr. Saunders the prisoner was discharged.

Before the court adjourned for dinner the grand jury came in and reported finding true bills on the following:

The King vs. Edgar Cannon for stealing foxes from the ranch of George Harbour, Mill River.

The King vs. Ernest Stapleton on a charge of entering and stealing foxes.

The King vs. Lemuel Coghlan on a charge of receiving stolen foxes.

In the case of the King vs. Frank Dawson on a charge of arson, no bill was found.

After making the above reports they again retired. At five o'clock finding no bill in the case of the King vs. Charles Burke on a charge of conspiring to steal foxes.

The grand jury, through their foreman, also presented their report, which included a number of recommendations. The report was as follows:

"We have examined the court-house and jail and find everything clean and in good condition. We also beg leave to submit the following recommendations:

1. That all prisoners confined in our county jail be set at some employment.

2. That the jail yard be enclosed with a proper fence.

3. That all boys and girls under 18 years of age, convicted of any criminal offence, be sent to a reformatory.

4. When crimes of a serious nature are committed we think it is the duty of the Government to secure the services of a Pinkerton detective and that they should be quietly placed on the case.

5. In our opinion, it is apparent that the boy Ernest Gallant, one of the witnesses appearing before us today, has been tampered with between the time of the preliminary hearing and the opening of the court.

6. That the members of the grand jury receive pay for their time and also travelling expenses."

After the grand jury presented their report the Chief Justice thanked them for the attention given by them to their work and ordered their discharge from further duty. Before court adjourned for the day, upon motion of the Attorney-General, the prisoners John Murray, Ernest Stapleton, Edgar Cannon and Lemuel Coghlan, upon whose cases the grand jury returned true bills, were arraigned and all pleaded not guilty. The Attorney General also made a motion that a bench warrant be issued for the arrest of Thomas Murray, against whom the grand jury had returned a true bill for stealing and conspiring to steal black foxes, which His Lordship ordered issued, after which court adjourned.

This morning when court resumed the case of the King vs. James Webster, on a charge of larceny, will be taken up and a jury empanelled to try the same.

OTTAWA, June 11.—In a report to-day the Railway Department indicates substantial progress on the Hudson Bay Railway. On twenty miles grading is completed and temporary rails laid. This will facilitate greatly the forwarding of supplies.

The bridge at Saskatchewan, Lepas when completed will cost \$300,000 and will be one of the big features of the undertaking. By the fall the rails will be down permanently on half the line. During summer the work will be pushed to the Hudson Bay terminals.

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., June 10.—A sad case of suicide is reported from a farmhouse about two miles from town. John Giles Jr. lived there with his wife who was formerly Miss Rebecca Davis of Brockway and with whom he was united in marriage about two years ago. For the past year Mrs. Giles had been ill with nervous trouble and was constantly attended by her husband and a woman housekeeper. This forenoon she escaped from their vigilance for about ten minutes and when search was made she was not to be found. Late in the afternoon her body was found in some woods back of the house, death having resulted from the use of paris green which nobody knew was on the premises, her husband having previously carefully removed everything of a dangerous nature that he knew to be about the place. Mrs. Giles was about twenty-five years of age and was respected by all. The husband has the sincere sympathy of the community in his great affliction.

WASHINGTON, June 12.—It is believed tonight that the consideration of the Senate will be resumed before the week end by the whole Senate as they are working now to get through committee. Free sugar in three years and free wool are the two items which caused the most trouble to the committee which had the tariff matter in hand. They were advanced another stage today, without alteration, as they were approved by the Democratic members of the finance committee. These sections will now be dealt with by a Democratic caucus and it is believed they will be approved of there. This being the fact further progress through the Senate is regarded as comparatively easy.

NEW YORK, June 12.—After deliberating twenty-five hours the Supreme Court jury that tried Peter J. Duffy, police sergeant, on a charge of bribery, disagreed 11 to 1 for conviction.

Duffy was paroled until tomorrow when he must produce \$5,000 bail pending the District Attorney's decision in the matter of a new trial.

This is the first of half a dozen or more so-called police graft trials in which the jury has not brought in a verdict of guilty after being out for a short time. Duffy was indicted as an alleged graft-taker from Julius Roth who ran poker rooms in Harlem. Roth testified that he made monthly payments to Duffy and prior to that to Eugene Fox, a policeman who pleaded guilty of graft. Fox corroborated Roth and added that he turned over to Duffy the list of graft-paying resorts with Roth in district.

OTTAWA, June 9.—During April the trade of Canada maintained the buoyancy which has characterized it for so long a time.

The total trade increased over 18 per cent from \$59,234,480, in April 1912, to \$70,505,160 in April 1913, while the exports of domestic merchandise increased 60 per cent from \$13,676,988 in April 1912, to \$22,016,880 in April 1913. The imports increased from \$45,607,491, in April 1912 to \$70,505,160 in April 1913; the duty collected increased from \$7,860,759 to \$8,463,576.

The most notable increase in exports in agricultural products which nearly doubled from \$5,936,313 to \$11,365,018. Manufacturers also went up from \$2,601,537 to \$3,487,598.

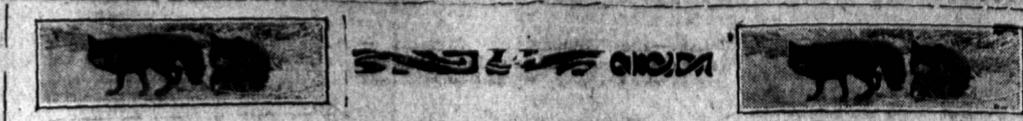
The militant suffragettes are arranging to hold a great demonstration at the funeral.
