FROM THE COUNTRY.—Professor Ross has just returned from a trip to his farm at Bedouque. While there he visited quite a lot of the surrounding country. He reports the prospect for the hay crop as excellent, and clover uniformly good. Although the season is much later than usual the hay crop seems to be about as well advanced as in other years. The farmers are all getting on splendidly with their work, the weather having been very favourable for working the soil. If the oats will be sold by the first week in June, the grass are all looking green. In Prince County a great many farmers are sowing banner oats with the expectation of joining the Banner Oat Club and marketing their oats as seed.

GOOD CATTLE.—Mr. James McDonald, of North Bedouque, owned a number of splendid steers which have just been sold to Messrs. Saunders & Newsome for delivery early this month. They will average over fourteen hundred pounds in weight and will be worth to Mr. McDonald about \$100 each. Mr. McDonald and his father have for years bred shorthorns; even when the price of beef was low they stuck to the shorthorn with the result that today they have a herd of shorthorns that are equal to many pure bred herds.—Mr. Stewart the owner of some good cattle. He has a fine Ayrshire bull from the herd of Turner & Sons, Ontario. This firm have for years been competing with McKee & Sons, East Royalty, for the Ayrshire championship of Canada. McKee took it with "Milkmaid 3" as a three-year-old, and the following year Turner's beat her and also the Canadian record for aged Ayrshire. McKee, however, has again taken it with "Milkmaid 7." Mr. Cairns' bull is particularly well-bred, out of a very high record cow. For several years he has been entering his cows in the Record of Performance test.

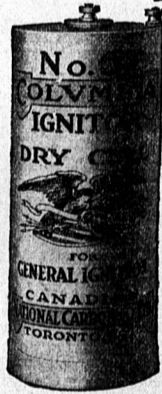

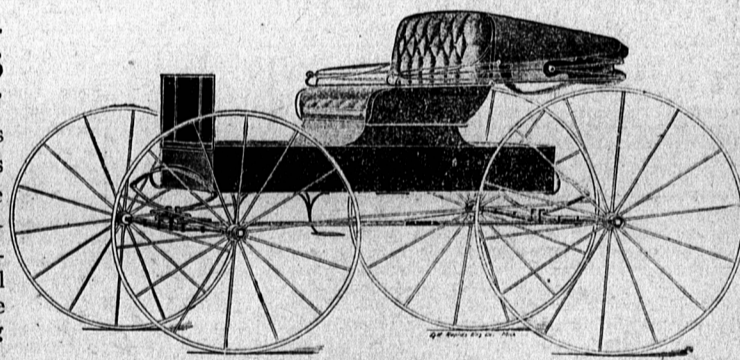
