For instance black ground figured cerise and white, purple and white, scarlet and white, purple and olive, cerise and Yale. Navy ground, figured heliotrope and cardinal; white and cardinal; purple ground, figured lilac and white, black and white, olive and white; cardinal ground, figured black and white, olive and white. The effect is enhanced in ties when the two figures are fairly close together and forming nearly one large figure, and these well spaced. 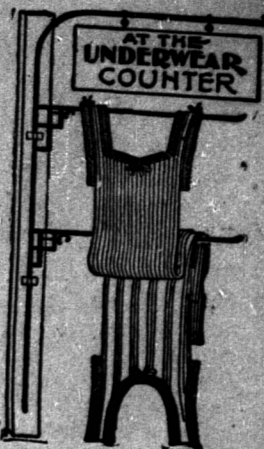
