

CITIZENS' TRIBUTE TO CONCL. FROST

sent at this meeting will feel that at least their sentiments have been voiced.

Mr. Roy Holman, at the chairman's request, expressed his regret at Mr. Frost's departure, which he thought was a blow to the Province.

In the near future, he hoped, it would be possible for Mr. Frost to visit with them again, not on a visit but to stay.

Mr. Holman then led the meeting in singing "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow." The proceedings then terminated, Mr. Frost taking private farewell of his friends.

A PARTING WORD. To a Guardian representative yesterday afternoon Mr. Frost accorded an interview, in the course of which he said:

"I have been very happy to have been in Charlottetown during these two particular years. I have seen what I may call the new spirit here begin, and with surprising rapidity assume gratifying proportions. There seems to be a lift in the air now and that could hardly be said of a couple of years ago when I came here.

The thing that I consider the island's strongest point is the social elevation, using these terms in the dictionary of the economist, and the fact that there is no poverty and that there is no ignorance, and the fact that every citizen takes a sincere interest in public affairs which is not observable in many communities where there are greater extremes of wealth and also greater extremes of poverty.

"I think Islanders sometimes fail to remember that their climate is just as alluring to, and exercises just as much glamour upon, the inhabitants of a southern climate as the semi-tropical Hesperian climate of the West Indies. People often say to me they suppose I find the climate severe. A northerner visiting in the South is often asked if he does not find the climate enervating and unpleasant. As a matter of fact, I believe most visitors in either direction enjoy their experiences.

"It would be superfluous for me to review the changes of the last two years in this island. If ever there were stagnation here it is unquestionably a thing of the past, and while the actual material changes may after all not be obstructive, every resident of the Province is aware of the change in atmosphere and the tendency of the times.

"When I came here I regarded the word 'American' in my title as a very vital one; and while, of course, I still so regard it, I have come to think of the position simply as that of 'Consul at Charlottetown.' There can be no question that I shall return to the Island as soon and as often as possible, and I am sure that no single locality in any part of the world holds a larger number of the people whom I call my friends than does the Island."

THE POLICE COURT.—At the Police Court in Charlottetown yesterday Herbert Edmonds for using obscene and abusive language on the 28th inst., was fined \$5 or 20 days. John MacMillan for being drunk and disorderly and interfering with the police was fined \$20 or 60 days. His honor severely reprimanded the prisoner and said if he would impose the full penalty, for interfering with the police, it would be six months imprisonment without the option of a fine. If any other cases come before him for this offence he would impose the full penalty. Two young lads appeared for being drunk but as it was their first offence they were dismissed.

MAY DEVOTIONS.—The usual Month of May devotions will begin in the Pro-Cathedral to-night at 7:30 o'clock, when the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament will be celebrated. The Children's Choir will be in attendance and will render some English hymns besides singing the Litany of the Blessed Virgin. Every evening during the month the Litany and some English hymns will be sung by the Children's Choir, but there will be Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament only on Wednesday and Friday evenings.

AMERICAN CONSULATE.—During the period between U. S. Consul Frost's departure and the arrival of his successor, who will be here in about six weeks' time, the duties of the Consulate will be performed by Dr. Strickland, the American Vice and Deputy Consul. Yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock Dr. Strickland took possession of the archives of the Consulate, relieving Mr. Frost, who leaves this morning for Cork, Ireland, where he goes to assume the duties of Consul there, to which position he has been promoted. The doctor administered to him the oath of office.

THE BISLEY TEAM.—It is yet to soon extend an open question whether Prince Edward Island will this year be represented on the Canadian team for Bisley—in other words, when Percy Landrigan, who shot his way into the team at the Dominion rifle meeting last year, will be permitted, in spite of uncompromising regulations, to take advantage of what is his moral right. Major A. A. Bartlett, Secretary of the Provincial Rifle Association of P. E. I., is in communication with the Minister of Militia, Hon. Col. Sam Hughes, on the subject of Landrigan's disqualification, and it is understood that the matter will again be brought before the Council of the D. C. R. A.

FILLING A LONG-FELT WANT.—For years there has been among the people of that locality a demand for a road to be opened leading to Wright's Bridge on the Malpeque Road. The Public Works Department has just concluded the bargain by which it will be able to fill that want, having purchased a road on John Andrew's property which is on the right side going out and leads to the bridge in question. Work will be commenced immediately in preparing the road for use.

RAILWAY TRAIN SERVICE.—Mr. Horace McEwan, Sup. of the P. E. I. R., returned last night from Moncton, where he had been on railway business. The Summer time-table will come into effect on May 6th. It will be practically the same as that of last year with the exception of a change in the route of the Cape Traverse train. This train will leave Cape Traverse early in the morning for Summerside and will leave Summerside at 11 a. m. for Charlottetown leaving the city on return to Cape Traverse at 5 o'clock. This change will give the people east of Emerald Junction an opportunity to come to Charlottetown and do business and return home, every day of the week. The western branch will have as usual two through-trains, one an express, leaving here in the morning, and a mixed train going out from the city at 3:30 p. m. The eastern branch service will also be the same as last year; the express train will run as at present and the mixed train, which leaves the city in the morning for Souris, returning in the evening, will leave Charlottetown daily, instead of three times a week as at present. The Murray Harbor service will be the same as at present but on June 22nd, a second train is to be added. It will be a mixed train and will leave Charlottetown in the morning, returning to the city in the evening.

THE FUR FARMERS' BUREAU & Exchange Limited, City, have purchased two farms on St. Peters Road, about four miles from the City. These have been procured for fox ranches and have been pronounced by experts to be one of the most suitably located in Prince-Edward Island. There is a capacity for 400 large fox pens on these farms. An up-to-date ranch for Fur Producers Limited will be located on this property. This ranch will be the largest and most modern in the world with every possible appliance for the safety of the foxes. 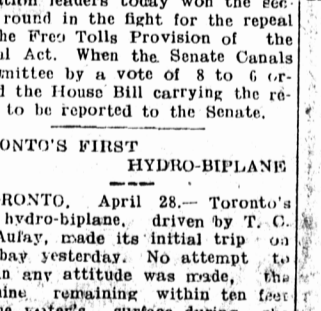
