NO MANUAL TRAINING.

Dominion Labor Congress Unanimously
Condemns the System.

OTTAWA, September 21.—The third day's meeting of the Dominion Labor Congress began at 8 a. m., with the consideration and passage of several resolutions. A regular discussion took place before passing unanimously a resolution condemning the manual training now being introduced into Canadian schools through the generosity of Sir Wm. McDonald. By the argument which prevailed technical training is upheld, but manual training is charged with producing nothing but "botchers" and incompetent, that is cheap labor, with sending into the labor markets children but half-equipped and pre-destined to the labor field. The reason for the introduction of manual training is alleged to be the over-crowding of professions and by its an effort is being made to divert the flow into the field of labor. It is called a capitalistic scheme to crowd the already glutted labor market. Manual training teaches only the "how" in the use of tools, but technical training teaches the "why." The technical school adds to the abilities and productive capacity of those who are already laboring men, but the manual school is only intended to increase the number. Every workman's shop is a manual training school, and the only proper training school. Laborers have a right to be a close corporation as well as other professions, and manual training found no defenders in the Congress, the main ground of objection being the predestination resulting from it.

MISSIONARY ORGANIZATION.

The Church Missionary Society of England had an income last year of over \$2,000,000, of which the amount from ordinary sources was over \$1,500,000. The Society has the largest revenue of any missionary organization in the world. It has 270,600 native Christian adherents, and 71,500 communicants.
