HERE'S ANOTHER FORECAST OF IRISH HOME RULE BILL

LONDON, April 4.—The home rule bill, which is to be introduced by Premier Asquith in the House of Commons on April 11, will, according to an evening paper, whose statement is based on the authority of a Nationalist member of parliament, whose name is not given, provide for an Irish parliament consisting of two houses, which will sit in Dublin.

The steamer here went through ice in some places three feet in thickness.

MEN LAND HUNGRY IN ALBERTA

LEITHBRIDGE, April 6.—Already over a hundred men are occupying positions outside the land office awaiting the opportunity to purchase by the Government on the first of May. It is charged that these men are becoming a menace to the public health, and are staying there day and night, and not keeping sanitary regulations. The chief of police has reported to the Board of Health to that effect, and an agitation is on to have the men forced to move on, and not allow anyone to take up positions. Some of the men come from places as many as a thousand miles away.

Decrease of Funds of Miners—Fifteen Hurt in Serious Riots
