FOURTH DEER HUNTER KILLED IN OREGON

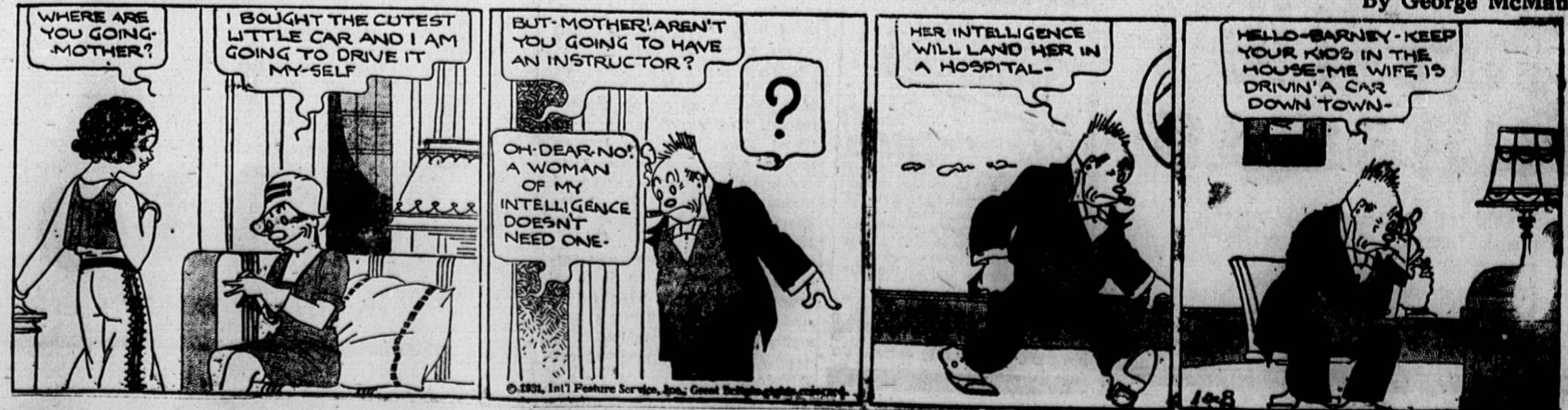
