A MEETING of the Summerside Board of Trade was held Saturday evening to further consider the matter of communication between Summerside and Cape Tormentine. There was a good attendance of representative business men. The project advanced at the quarterly meeting and previously referred to in this column to organize a company to promote a steamship line between this port and Cape Tormentine was fully and ably discussed. The advisability of taking steps towards the organization of a company was concurred in by all the speakers. In view of the fact however that the Summerside, Pt. du Chene route is likely to be opened the first of the week it was thought best to confer with the Federal Government and ascertain what steps are being taken towards placing the Cape Tormentine pier in proper condition for the accommodation of the Stanley and to ascertain positively if the Stanley is to be put on the route during the coming winter. Some of the speakers thought that if this was done it would solve the difficulty under which the Province is now laboring. If satisfactory assurance of this cannot be obtained then the Board should revert to the original proposition, and have a company organized. The following committee was appointed to confer with the government: Messrs. Neil McQuarrie, R. T. Holman, W. A. Brennan, and Richard Hunt.
