YOUNG GIRLS COMMIT SUICIDE

For Cause Unknown Found Drowned in a Reservoir. Mystery Surrounds Them

LONDON, Jan. 24 (Special)—Two 15-year-old girls have taken their lives at Rawliffe, near Gooles, under circumstances full of mystery, romance and pathos. Annie Elizabeth Horsley and Sarah Benistone, daughters of working class parents, had been engaged for the past few months at Turner's Paper Works, Rawliffe Bridge. On Thursday they attended their work in the ordinary course, but disappeared shortly before the usual time for closing the mill, and late at night their bodies were found in the waters of a reservoir, their legs bound together by a piece of thin rope, and their arms clasped in the embrace of death.

ALL OVER EUROPE

ODESSA, Jan. 24 (Special)—It is announced that the Government has finally resolved to subsidize the projected new Russian steamship line between Odessa and London, which will commence operations early in the new year. The amount of the subsidy is not yet stated, but it is generally understood that each of the four 6,000-ton steamers to be placed on the new line will receive a subsidy of \$25,000 per annum for a term of five years.

The outward-bound liners will load part of their general cargo at Nicolaiet, and in the United Kingdom the subsidiary port of call will be Hull. Fourteen days is the maximum time allowance, fixed by the Minister of Trade and Industry, for the outward and homeward trips between Odessa and London. The liners will have accommodation for first, second, and third-class passengers.

PARIS, Jan. 21 (Special)—The "soup-bout" bequeathed to the city of Bordeaux by M. Osiris has been inaugurated on the Gironde River. M. Osiris was a native of Bordeaux, and left that city \$400,000 for the purpose of building and maintaining a free food refectory for French and foreign workpeople.

PARIS, Jan. 21 (Special)—A prize of \$100,000, to be contributed to by all the chief motor-car clubs in the world, is to be offered for a new motor-car fuel, rendered necessary by the rapid increasing price of petrol. The new fuel must be easy to manufacture with substance of which there is a constant supply, such as alcohol, and which are not likely to fluctuate in price except with general alterations in money values.

DUBLIN, Jan. 21 (Special)—Further sensational statements on the loss of the Crown jewels from Dublin Castle were made in the House of Commons recently by Mr. Ginnell, the Nationalist member for Westmeath, and once again the Chief Secretary denied all knowledge of the allegations made. Mr. Ginnell alleged that "the greatest scoundrel in South Africa at the time of the Boer War—a reckless bully, a murderer, and a man of debauched habits," who had risen from the ranks to be a captain, was allowed to resign his commission, then went to Ireland, where, "as if nothing had happened," he was given a commission in an Irish regiment.

ACCIDENT CAUSED BY A PARROT

Mistakes Conductor's Voice and Starts Car While People Were Entering

BRUSSELS, Jan. 24 (Special)—A parrot kept at a house at Jupille, near Liege, in front of which tramway-cars stop regularly, learned to imitate the conductor's whistle. While two people were entering the car the parrot whistled and the driver, thinking it was the conductor, started the car, with the result that the two people fell and were injured.

An alarm of fire was given at four o'clock in the morning from the storage barracks. The firemen were able, by the aid of respirators and masks, to penetrate the building despite the noxious fumes, and extinguish the flames before they reached the explosives.

GENEVA, Jan. 22 (Special)—A pathetic tragedy, resulting from an attempt to steal a kiss under the mistletoe, is reported from St. Gall. After a merry dinner, Mlle. Schwoh, aged 20, entered the ball-room at her house, and, standing on a stool, was trying on a bunch of mistletoe before the dance begun when she was surprised by her fiancé, who attempted to steal a kiss.

VIENNA, Jan. 22 (Special)—Three youths entered a cafe in Vienna, the other night, seated themselves in a secluded corner, and ordered tea. Soon after the dull noise of falling bodies was heard above the din of the billiard playing and conversation in the cafe. A waiter hastened to see what had happened and found all three lying on the floor, evidently in a throes of death. Assistance was called and it was discovered that the youths had taken poison with fatal results.

MYSTERIOUS DEATH OF CATTLE MAN

Was Found Robbed And Hanged in Second Class Railway Car

BERLIN, Jan. 24 (Special)—A millionaire cattle-raiser named Berger has been found dead in mysterious circumstances in the train near Chemnitz, Saxony. When the train arrived at the station near Chemnitz the millionaire was discovered hanging from the ceiling of the second-class compartment. At first it was supposed that he had committed suicide, but an investigation revealed the fact that several hundreds of dollars in cash, which he had taken with him to purchase breeding stock, had been taken from his pockets. The police are searching for a farmer who recently entered the murdered man's service after being released from a convict prison. It is believed that the ex-convict induced Berger to make a journey and either accompanied him or got in the same train by surprise.

FINNS OBSTINATE RESIST RUSSIANS

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 24 (Special)—The Finns are threatened with another blow, which they are inevitably bringing upon themselves by their phenomenally obstinate resistance to the enactments of the Russian Duma and the orders of the Emperor in matters of legislation for strengthening the unity of the Empire at large, and ensuring equal treatment for Russians in the Grand Duchy. Every year for the last five years Diet after Diet has protested, petitioned, and uncompromisingly rejected every Russian measure or proposal put before it. Two more petitions from the latest Diet have been sent to St. Petersburg by the Governor-General with the usual advice to give them a negative answer, while the Finns obstinately and judges at Viborg are petitioning the Emperor for a second time against the increasing arrests of passive resisters and recalcitrant local officials and their conveyance to St. Petersburg for trial.
