Roumanians Repulse German Attacks

(Special to the Guardian)
BUCHAREST, Oct. 12.—Roumanian troops yesterday repulsed attacks of General Von Falken Hay's army in Transylvania, the War Office announced today. The statement follows:—
On the northern and northwestern fronts between Kelem and Buxen as far as Bran our troops repulsed several enemy attacks. At Colt, east of Cainenil, attacks of the enemy were repulsed. On the remainder of the front as far as the Danube, there were artillery and infantry engagements. On the southern Danube front there were artillery duels. The situation in Dobruja is unchanged.

Great Anger Among The Dutch People

Extreme Limit of Patience With Germany is Reached.

(Canadian Press Despatch)
AMSTERDAM, Oct. 12.—It is impossible to exaggerate the indignation of the Dutch over the sinking of the Bloomsday by German submarine U-53 of the American coast.

This small country, long suffering under countless provocations, injuries and insults from Germany, feels that the extreme limit of its patience has been reached in the latest achievement of their powerful eastern neighbor. A German submarine commander's explanation that he was instructed to sink all ships calling at British ports is regarded as the last straw.

Reports are current here that Herr Bullin had informed members of the Holland-American line that it was the government's policy to prevent all traffic between the United Kingdom and European countries, whether neutral ships or not. The Dutch press only gives utterance to the national anger when it says, as voiced by Handelsblad, "What does the Dutch government think of doing in reply to this serious threatening of our existence? We have been humiliated our flag outraged, and our merchant fleet threatened with destruction." In view of the destruction of the Tubantia, Palembang and Berkelstroom, the Handelsblad asks if the Dutch government will again shrug its shoulders.

Her Volk says it is impossible to regard the torpedoing of the Bloomsday as otherwise than a hostile act to both Holland and the United States.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy is not permitted. The homestead must be situated on the land in which the homestead is to be made. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties must be paid in each of three years. A homestead may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties must be paid in each of three years. A homestead may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

SERMON BY CANON SIMPSON TO NO. 5 SIEGE BATTERY

Following is an outline of the farewell sermon delivered before the officers and men of No. 5 Siege Battery at St. Peter's Cathedral by Rev. Canon Simpson before their departure overseas:

"A Good Soldier of Jesus Christ."—2 Tim. 2, 3. I am sure you men of the Fifth Siege Battery had good advice in abundance bestowed upon you at the various church parades but as this is the first opportunity I have had of addressing you, and will also be the last, I would like to say a few words of exhortation before you leave.

You have enlisted to fight against the enemies of the Empire; remember also, the fight against your spiritual foes, as good soldiers of Jesus Christ.

Your act of self-sacrifice on behalf of your country does not release you from such spiritual warfare, but rather emphasizes it. Satan will do his best to persuade you that such self-sacrifice exempts you from the ordinary rules of conduct. That is not true.

You have had during the last few months, and will have now, more than ever, to you many new temptations. In barracks life is very different from home life, and camp life in England will be still more different, and the conditions will call for much watchfulness and resolution if you would keep undefiled.

Specially you will have to face the three evils of profanity, intemperance and immorality. Let me warn you against them.

First—Profanity. I do not suggest for a moment that swearing and blasphemy and loud talk have hitherto been unknown to you, for, alas! the habit is so common in all walks of life, and is so little accounted of, even among professing Christians, that if a show of hands were called for, ten could hardly be found who would honestly say that they never gave way to bad language. But the army has always been notorious for profanity: "Our forces were horribly in Flanders." In Marlborough's time, we are told, and there is the common expression "He swears like a trooper."

I would hope that Kitchener's army (being drafted from a class of men greatly superior to that from which the ordinary British soldier is drawn) would act as leaven, and not only keep themselves free from this degrading habit, but also influence others to be less irreverent. But this has not been the case. The evil has spread throughout the millions of recruits, and men who before enlistment would have been shocked at such ribald expressions as are used, now use them themselves without the slightest provocation.

You may think you know something about swearing already. I tell you when you get overseas you will find yourself in the first class so far as profanity is concerned. I know whereof I speak, although zealous chaplains, who only see their men at parade services, write to the papers to say they never hear any bad language. Of course they don't, because they do not see them outside the ranks, and then they will know better. I suppose in all the 30 years I have been in this congregation I have not heard ten times a member of it use any word stronger than "dam." But I am not foolish enough to trust that account to vouch for the language which is used when the men are without, utterly without use or profit. Other sins bring some recompense the excitement of his orgie, the adoration of his gratification of his himself, the habit gets some gain for its punishment. But the swearer! What does he profit? He does nothing but hurl gratuitous insults at Almighty God, Who not only gives him life but sustains him even while he curses. If we really believe that God's Scripture says He is, we would not dare to treat Him thus, for He has declared "The Lord will not hold him guiltless that taketh His name in vain."

Men think that the plea of habit will release them from blame. But test that by other sins. Would a magistrate acquit you of theft because you told him that stealing was only a bad habit? Would you get from punishment if you pleaded that your drunkenness was only a little habit of yours and did not mean anything? Then why should you expect the Almighty God to condone your habit of blasphemy, which you can always repress before your superiors if you like.

And profanity is not only senseless, it is the mark of a cowardly heart. The swearer, by his words, says I cannot offend against the laws of the land, I cannot steal, or murder, or slander my neighbor, lest I be sent to prison, but I can insult God himself, and the worst that can come of it, is but a trifling matter.

What would happen if you used the names of your officers in their presence, with the same levity and flippancy and irreverence as you use the name of God, and of Jesus Christ our Lord? Remember that God is always present. I ask you to resolve to treat His men with at least the same respect as you treat your officers, and that will help you to check other forms of profanity.

With regard to intemperance it is unnecessary to speak at any length. First, because intemperance is an offence against military regulations. If you drink to excess you will be punished. If you persist you will be dismissed from the service. You will never be punished for profanity among yourselves, or for immorality. And then, too, you have, all of you, I suppose, had the duty of temperance, if not of total abstinence, impressed upon you from your infancy.

I would exhort you strongly to be total abstainers as long as you are in the army. You are young and strong, and in good physical condition from your training, you cannot possibly need stimulants, under ordinary conditions, and there is a great temptation, (if you use them at all), to fall into excess; and the open bars and wet canteens in England will be a constant menace to you, unless you

are pledged. It would be a splendid thing, therefore, if every officer and man in the Battery could leave here, pledged to total abstinence, at least till after the war.

And then there is the sin of impurity. This, like profanity, is not unknown to you—you have already had to face its temptations and perhaps may have fallen into it. Remember, however, since enlistment, that overseas you will find this different. Whereas here this vice has to be sought,—must be followed after, to a great extent, deliberately; in England it will seek you, and assail you with relentless persistence; for this evil finds itself everywhere, openly, shamelessly, and almost unrestrained. Forwarned is forearmed. Be prepared to resist,—not in your own strength, but in the strength you will receive from Almighty God in answer to prayer. And remember that if strong drink has slain its thousands, impurity has slain its tens of thousands. A man who drinks to excess cannot hold his sin,—a man may be a sensualist, a fornicator, a very moral leper, and yet pose before his family and associates as a pattern of purity. This secret sin is far more prevalent than intemperance, but because it is secret is little referred to in public.

Our insane asylums are full of victims of self-abuse, and there are hundreds of men who are rotting to death from venereal diseases; and there are thousands and tens of thousands in our army today, whose strength is wasted and whose efficiency is reduced,—who are less vigorous and less able to withstand the strain of the campaign than would have been the case if they had kept themselves pure.

But I only refer to these physical dangers and penalties in passing. The man who abstains from sensual sin only because he is afraid of contracting disease is no better than a libertine, and freedom from disease does not lessen the guilt of the transgressor.

Keep thyself pure, because you are a child of God, and God hates impurity. Listen to the words of St. Paul: "Know ye not that your bodies are the members of Christ? shall I then take the members of Christ and make them the members of an harlot? God forbid!"

"What? know ye not that he which is joined to an harlot is one flesh? for two, saith he, shall be one flesh."

"But he that is joined unto the Lord is one spirit."

"Flee fornication. Every sin that a man doeth is without the body; but he that committeth fornication sinneth against his own body."

"What? know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price, therefore glorify God in your body, which is God's."

What does it mean to be a member of Christ? Your body is a member of Christ,—it is the Temple of the Holy Ghost,—it is not your own,—it is God's. How can you defile the Holy Spirit's temple,—Christ's member,—that which is given you by God to glorify Him therewith?

Remember impurity has its origin in the thoughts of the heart. Impure words and acts are first conceived in the heart, for says our Blessed Lord, "Out of the heart come forth evil thoughts,—adulteries, fornications,—and 'out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh.'" Never allow yourself to dwell on filthy imaginations,—never join in filthy conversation, or in impure jokes,—never look at obscene pictures. It has been said to me by one on active service "The sins of the flesh are so often the subject of jest in the barrack room,—they are spoken of as being quite necessary, and quite harmless, that we soon grow to think lightly of them, and then comes the first fall. After that it is hard to pull up. After thoughts of your heart, pure, it is no easy matter to check this sin,—to keep control over your thoughts, your eyes, your words, and to help others to do so. It will need courage,—but united action can effect much good. None of you are naturally depraved,—most of you would rather, I doubt not, suppress bad talk, but you are afraid to make a start. What! shall you be brave enough to give up your prospects, your work, your comfort, your position, to fight the battles of the Empire, and have you no courage,—can you make no sacrifices for the Kingdom of Heaven's sake, and for the defeat of its enemies? You are each one of you, his brother's keeper, and you older ones may be the means, by your example of making or marring the lives of the younger.

As you go forth to take your part in this struggle of might against right,—of the mailed fists of Germany against the mailed hand of the crucified Christ, my prayer for you, one and all, is that Almighty God will protect you in all dangers, temporal and spiritual, and bring you back unharmed in body and soul, for the praise of His glorious name.
