Price Control Questions And Answers

Questions and Answers on Price Control will appear in The Guardian as a regular feature each day. The questions are those which have reached the Wartime Prices and Trade Board from housewives in this region. The answers are provided by the Board members. Persons who have intelligent questions to ask on price control are invited to send them in writing to the Women's Regional Advisory Committee of the War Times Prices and Trade Board.

Q. I sent my child to the grocer to buy butter and tea and he refused to sell it as the child had loose coupons. I do not like to trust the ration books to a child. Was my grocer correct?

A. Your grocer is quite correct. It is illegal to deal in loose coupons.

Q. I have been dealing at the same bakery for several years. In the last few months they have increased the prices for fruit pies, cakes and meat pies. Each item is only up one or two cents. Can they do this?

A. You should not be charged a higher price for these items than was charged by the same store during the basic period, Sept. 15 to October 11, 1941.

Q. Since meat rationing has been suspended is there still a price ceiling on meats?

A. Yes. Butchers and all those selling meat at retail must have the regular meat charts posted in their stores in a position where the consumer may see them. These charts show the cuts of meat and prices at which the retailer is allowed to sell them.

CHILDREN SHOULD KNOW TRUTH Glad To Help Parents When They Realize Sacrifices Must Be Made In Homes

The greatest mistake that parents make consists in undervaluing the intelligence of their children. It is a ridiculous thing to say in innumerable instances that the baby broods just as natural as can be. Nevertheless, although the adoring fathers and mothers see smiles in the little deadpan faces that are just as innocent of expression as a cream cheese and expect their offspring to, at least, grow up and understand anything that their mothers do. Yet any mother will tell you that by the time a baby is three weeks old it has already found out how to get what it wants, and has settled for all time who is going to be boss in that house.

PARENTS' BELIEF CAUSES CONFLICTS

To this fixed belief of parents that their children are nitwits who can't understand what it is all about is due the conflicts between parents and children that can stand alone.

Most of the trouble between parents and children stems back to and to deal with them on that platform. Take the lack of obedience, for instance, which is the pet grievance of most of the fathers and mothers you know. "Johnny won't do a thing I say," Father complains. "Mary won't listen to me," wails Mother. And it never occurs to either one of them that the reason the children don't obey them is because they know how much they detest themselves for being disobedient. They refuse to do it because they don't want the youngsters to be burdened with their troubles. Mother works herself to death in the kitchen while the girls play tennis for exercise. Father goes shabby so the boys can have fancy sweaters, and then complains about how selfish the children are in taking the best of everything without even saying "thank you."

CHILDREN WOULD BE GLAD TO HELP

Yet the children would gladly help and make their own sacrifices cheerfully if Mother and Father would only confide in them and tell them how hard times are, and how little they had to spend. Many think their parents heroes if he knew how hard they worked and thinking they are tightwads and being grouchy because they didn't give him more.

In dealing with their children most parents appeal exclusively to their affections. They would get better results if they appealed to their intelligence.

ORANGE RIND AS FLAVORING FOR COOKIES

A mixture of two tablespoons of sugar and a teaspoon of grated orange rind, sprinkled over sugar cookies, gives them an unusual flavor. THE COOK'S CORNER

HAM AND EGG PIE

1-1/2 lb. cooked ham (1-1/2 cups cubed)
2 tablespoons chopped onion
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper (optional)
3 hard-cooked celery
5 tablespoons flour
1-4 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons fat
2-1/4 cups milk

Brown the onion and green pepper in the fat. Add flour and blend well. Add milk gradually. Cook and stir until thickened. Add remaining ingredients and turn into a casserole. Top with cheese pinwheels and bake in a 400 deg. F. oven for 30 minutes. Left-over ham may be cubed and used in this pie instead of the ham.
