The Associated banks, a confederation consisting of five or six of the strongest banks in Canada, handed out a statement at Toronto, on Friday, to the effect that they had decided to take over the Sovereign bank, assume its obligations and undertake its business. The Sovereign has been in need of capital for some time, and the recent reorganization when General Manager D. M. Stewart retired, and J. Pierpont Morgan secured a controlling interest, has evidently not had the success that was anticipated. It is understood that the Canadian Bank of Commerce was anxious to take over the Sovereign bank itself, but other banks refuse to allow this. As a compromise the Associated banks stepped in and will assume all liabilities. The depositor and general public will thus lose nothing. The shareholders of the Sovereign, however, will probably suffer somewhat, though to what extent is not made public. The Halifax Herald's Toronto correspondent adds a note that the bankers are very reticent regarding the "amalgamation" as they call it. He had not been able, when wiring, to find what banks are concerned, but two of them he said are probably the Bank of Commerce and Toronto. Duncan Coulson, general manager of the Bank of Toronto, is chairman of the associated banks. The capital of the Sovereign bank was \$4,000,000. The par value of the shares is \$100.
