CASE AGAINST C. N. R. CONTINUES - The defence called ten witnesses yesterday in the case of Wellington McNeill vs. C. N. R. which commenced Monday in the Supreme Court. Most of them were French speaking residents of Quebec and Dr. J. H. Blanchard acted as interpreter for the court. On Monday a large scale plea was made by the defence but it was rejected as evidence because it was not drawn to scale. Yesterday the defence introduced a new large scale copy made overnight by Charles Milton from a blueprint which had been previously proved. Most of the evidence yesterday was about the condition of the rolling stock and road bed but included that of Gerard Higgins, 18, of St. Jean Chrysostome, who testified to placing a metal nut on the track prior to the derailment. It is expected that the case will be finished today.

TAKE HEALTH COURSE - In connection with the plans for extending the health services for the Province under the national health scheme, professional training courses have been set up for Miss Thelma Reid of Victoria Cross, Miss Annabel Allen and Miss Dorothy Gallant of Summerside, to enable them to train as Dental Hygienists. They leave this week for Boston where they have been accepted for a year's course at the Forsyth Dental Infirmary. On their return to the island they will be in the charge of the Dental Division of the Department of Health and Welfare.

A local I.O.D.E. group, the L.M. Montgomery chapter, began recently a food parcel project in co-operation with England's Women's Voluntary Services, sending cases of tinned meats and fish for distribution among British community clubs hard hit by rationing. "Thank you letters have been received from the recipient regiments. Mrs. R. MacNeil, of Miss Elsa Danham, Head of Empire and Foreign Department of W.M.S. as well as from supervisors of clubs throughout the island. The parcels from P.E.I. was distributed among the 'Darby and Joan' clubs for elderly people.

These clubs were formed in the wake of the evacuation of Canadian people find it very difficult to manage relations as, of course, they are usually too frail and often too infirm to stand about in tiring queues. The L.M. Montgomery chapter plan to continue their food parcels and at a recent meeting formed a committee to study money-raising projects to finance their year's work. Members of the committee are Mrs. Stewart MacKay, convener, Mrs. Stanley Lancaster, Mrs. Wilbur Andrew.

"The training of the people in the jewellery business so that they may be totally informed about the goods they buy is the purpose of the Canadian Jewellers Institute," stated Mr. H. Leitch, General Manager of the Canadian Jewellers Association at the Charlottetown Hotel last night. Mr. Carl Crockett, Summerside, President of the Island Association was chairman. The members, headed by their president Mr. F. B. MacParren, Toronto heard Mr. Leitch describe the functions of the Institute which has been formed by members of the Canadian Jewellers Association. The Institute proposes to give courses to young Canadians, who desire to learn the jewelry trade with possibility that the first course will begin some time this fall.

The idea of forming the Institute was derived from the National Association of Goldsmiths in England. The material was obtained from this Association and Canadianized by a committee of twelve trained men. The Jewellers of Canada have subscribed \$130,000 to the Institute to be used in helping worthy and able students. Ten bursaries were granted last year and 15 more will be granted this year. Mr. Leitch expects that about 100 students from all parts of Canada can be accommodated for the first course. The course will last two years and diplomas will be granted upon completion.

FRIDAY - CARS COLLIDE - Two cars collided at the intersection of Prince and Grafton Streets about 11:25 last night causing considerable damage to both cars and sending one man to hospital for medical examination. A girl passenger in the Grafton Street car was not injured. Six people were in the 1948 Dodge proceeding West on Grafton Street while the driver was the sole occupant of the car. The Prince Street vehicle stopped on top of the sidewalk at the corner of Zion Church while the other car came to rest about 45 feet ahead of it on the sidewalk. Damage to the Dodge included a broken grill, bumper, right front head light and smashed right side. Damage to the Ford included a smashed right wheel, front fender and broken windows. The driver of the Ford was apprehended for drunken driving.

George Drew's retirement to take over the leadership of the Conservative Party and Hon. James Mackenzie, the present Premier took over. Minister of Agriculture previously, he has held that office continuously since 1943 except for his service as acting premier.

Four Arrested in Montreal Narcotics Seizure

MONTREAL, Sept. 15 - (CP) - A slightly-built Roman Catholic priest, clad in non-descript civilian clothing and wearing dark glasses, stood in Judge's chambers today and pleaded innocent to charges of illegal sale of narcotics. The appearance of 48-year-old Rev. Arthur Taillefer followed the sensational disclosure by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police that a cache of heroin worth \$90,000 had been seized in a public baggage locker in Montreal's Windsor Station and two men arrested.

It was the largest narcotics seizure in Montreal's history of peddling and racketeering in drugs. R.C.M.P. officers described the Arthur Taillefer arrested as a Roman Catholic priest of Montreal. The other man was identified as Michel Sisco, 35, of Montreal. Four hours after the arraignment of Father Taillefer and Sisco, R.C.M.P. announced that two more men had been arrested in connection with the case. They were Rosario Delisle, 48, and William Lamy, 32. Delisle was charged with conspiracy to distribute drugs while Lamy was charged with possession of heroin.

Inspector Brady of the R.C.M.P. said Lamy and Delisle would be arraigned tomorrow morning on the drug charges "and possibly more." He didn't elaborate. Father Taillefer, who is vicar of the parish of Ste. Madeleine D'Outremont in greater Montreal's North End, was identified only by name, with no reference to ecclesiastical title, at his appearance before Judge Gerald Almond.

Sisco also pleaded innocent of the same charge, appearing with Father Taillefer. Both men were ordered into custody on a three-day verbal remand and trial before a judge alone, which both men elected, was set for Sept. 22. Roman Catholic Church authorities could not be reached by newspaper men in an effort to determine whether any Church action has been taken or will be taken against Father Taillefer. Almost coincident with the arraignment, Montreal city police, who have arrested more than 50 persons in the last few months for illegal possession of narcotics, announced the arrest of Frank Perreault, 21, brother of a hanged murderer, on a similar charge.

The discovery came through the intensive work of a special 12-man squad of R.C.M.P. constables during the last few months. R.C.M.P. said they believed the huge cache, made up of 15,000 tiny capsules of heroin weighing 22 ounces, was brought into Montreal for quick distribution among addicts by dope peddlers. They estimated the value of the heroin at \$45,000 if sold through regular channels.
