IMPROVEMENT OF RURAL SCHOOLS

instruction and training for teachers of rural schools who desire to qualify in these newer subjects and methods of education. An elaborate building and equipment is provided at Guelph, Ont., on grounds adjacent to the Ontario Agricultural College. Provision is made for the free training of a limited number of teachers by providing tuition, railroad fees, and twenty-five dollars to help meet expenses of board and lodging for the course of three months.

Part 4 provides for a course in Household Science for young women from rural communities. The course is especially suited to farmers' needs. Short courses of three months will be arranged, as well as the full course of two years. Suitable classrooms and a dormitory have been provided on grounds adjacent to the O. A. C. and near the nature-study building. The total cost of these two buildings alone is \$175,000.

All four parts of the plan are now in operation. The McDonald school a-

calls for more training than our fathers received. Can the small-sized country school fulfill the requirements?

When our social life demands leaders, a secondary school arises as medicine, one hundred, and half fifty years ago. Agriculture is demanding leaders and many agricultural schools are arising. The great advance of agricultural education in America has called for comment from prominent educationalists, some of whom predict that we shall see in the near future, rural schools, agricultural high schools, and agricultural colleges working together.

In our common schools are found studies which are not required for admission to colleges. Nature-study, drawing, the manual arts—all introduced during the past few years—are yet neglected by the colleges. Will the college fulfil the requirements by working around to the schools' standpoint? If the justification of the existence of the common school is to train for good citizenship, and for ability to earn a livelihood, can the study of French, or instance, in the common school be justified?

If we can introduce a more rational point of view into our teaching of country children, it must be by appealing to the experience of the child. This is the nature-study method. The child's experience is with nature. If the child can be led to control the objects and forces in his environment, his curve of happiness will rise. Improve methods of teaching and excellent teachers and conditions can be secured by concentration. With all the advantages of centralizing schools, the rural school, as of yore, becomes the ideal place

Guelph has already 100 students in domestic science, and 85 in nature study. The travelling instructors are all at work. School consolidation has been effected in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Ontario and Prince Edward Island, and the results are better than even the most sanguine have hoped for. The Middleton School has been pronounced by a competent critic the "best of its kind in the world."

Consolidation and transportation of pupils is now practiced by seventeen states of the Union. The idea is rapidly gaining ground and is the only solution of the rural school problem in sight. The advantages of consolidation are summed up as follows:

1. It permits better grading of pupils.
2. It affords an opportunity for instruction in special branches as music, drawing, etc.
3. It lessens the work of the inspector. Fewer are employed.
4. It tends to better buildings, better heated and ventilated.
5. The larger classes possess more enthusiasm and rivalry.
6. More culture from association.
7. Better equipment—more books, charts, maps and apparatus.
8. It allows the employment of better teachers—for fewer are required.
9. It gives a better unit of government. The usual rural district is too small for

good government; the county unit is too large. The happy mean is the township or a consolidated district of about the same size.

10. Public interest and pride in the school are quickened.
11. The same carriages that convey the children, can distribute the mails.
12. Better health of pupils. They are less exposed in stormy weather, and are not compelled to sit all day in damp clothing.
13. The vans can be used for transporting parents to public gatherings, lecture courses, etc.
14. Pupils attend school more regularly. Attendance at these schools has invariably increased from about fifty per cent, to about ninety per cent. This is explained in some cases by the people's desire to secure their money's worth, which is only an increase in their appreciation of the value of the school.

This is an age of concentration. It has touched our farming commerce, manufacturing, mining and politics. We have to rapidly adjust ourselves to new conditions. [The uses of electricity and steam, the valuable knowledge accumulated by the various governments through their experimental stations—all the application of science to the every-day affairs of life

to bring up children. The establishment of good schools in the country would help to check the city-ward tendency. An independent, intelligent rural community would be a protecting balance in our political life. "The anarchy of the city poor, the greed and snobbery of the rich, would each find an antidote in the content and conservation of a great agricultural class." All our trade and well-being is dependent on the prosperity of the country.
