The questions are those which have reached the Wartime Prices and Trade Board from housewives in this region. The answers are provided by the Board members. Persons who have intelligent questions to ask on price control are invited to send them in writing to the Women's Regional Advisory Committee of the War Times Prices and Trade Board.

Q. Before rationing of jam, syrups, etc., came in, the storekeepers would not put these articles on their shelves, and to some persons he had them and to others he didn't. Such is now the case with peanut butter, gum and other things. Can they be allowed to do this?

A. Retail merchants have been asked by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board to distribute goods which are in short supply on a fair and equitable basis to their customers.

Q. Is it still necessary to turn in used toothpaste and shaving cream tubes? My retailer demanded that I turn in tubes before he would let me have new toothpaste.

A. Citizens have been asked to continue to turn in the old tubes on a voluntary basis. Tin from these tubes can still be salvaged and help the war effort. It is not compulsory to turn them in in order to secure a new tube however.

TEAM-WORK NEED IN HOMES

Its Lack Responsible For Practically Every Boy And Girl Going Astray

The one place where team-work is more needed than anywhere else is in the home, yet nowhere else in the world is there so little cooperation as in the family circle. The average home is not a democracy; it is an autocracy run by a ruthless tyrant who brooks no rival near the throne, and to this fact is due most of the domestic ills from which we suffer.

The two chief sources of our tears and heartbreaks are unhappy marriages and delinquent children, and it does not take any Sherlock Holmes to trace both of these griefs right back to the despot on the hearthstone who, often more than not, is the wife and mother whose intentions are the best, but whose method are those of Mr. Hitler.

There is no more sardonic joke than that which pictures marriage as a partnership. It rarely is. Almost always it is a one-man or one-woman show. Occasionally there is a husband who rules his household with a rod of iron, but, ninety-nine times out of a hundred, it is Mom who is the one who must be obeyed, and the husband has no more authority in the house than the cat.

AN EASTER GARNISH FOR YOUR BAKED HAM

To make the intriguing white narcissus garnish in the picture, peel turnips and cut slices 2 1/2 inches in diameter; divide each in 6 equal parts by making three with knife leaving a centre the size of a dime. With scissors shape into ovals, the petals made by these slices. Now for the centres cut a round shape from a thick slice; hollow out and attach with toothpick leaving long end of pick on under side. Touch outer edge of centres with paprika. Fasten picks into 2-inch high clusters of spinach stems. Turn bottoms so clusters will stand up. Between clusters we suggest bundles of buttered carrots.

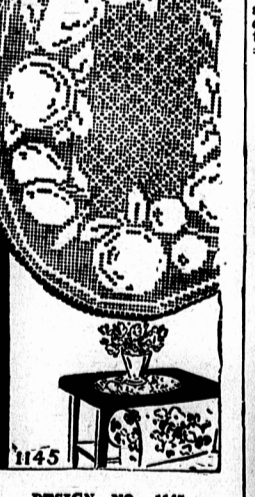
SUNNING UNDER DIFFICULTIES
