SCIENCE TO HELP SLAUGHTER FISH

(British United Press) LONDON, Nov. 6.—Research directed to assist in forecasting the positions of stocks of fish in the North Sea is attracting a good deal of attention in the fishing industry. Early results of experiments suggest that it may soon be possible to produce charts, similar to weather charts, showing patches of animal and plant life on which fish feed, and to correlate these with catches of fish in different areas, also with the physical state of the sea and meteorological conditions.

The work is being undertaken by zoologist to the discovery expedition professor A. C. Hardy, who was chief and who was appointed last year to the chair of zoology at the Hull University College. An instrument devised by Professor Hardy to assist him in his experiments and which is known as the Continuous Plankton Recorder, is torpedo shaped, and so constructed as to float horizontally through the water when towed by a vessel. It is open at each end, and across the stream of water passing through the instrument is a long strip of fine mesh silk netting, arranged to wind from one roller to another, the action being similar to the winding of a film in a camera.
