AN Ottawa despatch of March 5th says:---A military order issued gives the basis of organization of the provisional battalion which is to garrison Halifax in place of the Leinsters. The corps will include a lieutenant-colonel, major and adjutant, 8 captains, 16 lieutenants, and a quarter-master sergeant major, quarter-master sergeant, 5 staff sergeants, 8 color sergeants and 33 sergeants, 40 corporals, 16 drummers and buglers; and 872 privates. Total, 1,004. The men are to be 18 to 45, unmarried, 5 feet 5 inches high, 34 inches chest, must belong to the regular militia and have performed one annual training. The pay will be that of the permanent corps or Canada namely forty cents per day from date of enlistment. Companies are numbered from "A" to "H" beginning at British Columbia. "G" Company will contain three sections from district number 8, formed at St. John, and one section from district number 12 at Charlottetown. "H" will be from district number 9, formed at Halifax. Companies B. C. and D. will concentrate at Ottawa not later than Thursday, 15th inst., and A company at the same place one week later. E. and F. at Quebec 16th; G. and H. at Halifax Saturday, 17th. Companies B to F will be clothed and equipped at points of concentration. Companies B to F will be at Halifax by Thursday, 22nd. The regimental will be formed at Ottawa by Colonel Vidal who will assume temporary command.

Rev. Adam Gunn returned to his home in Bloomfield yesterday afternoon. Mr. Gunn was in the city attending the meeting of the Presbytery.

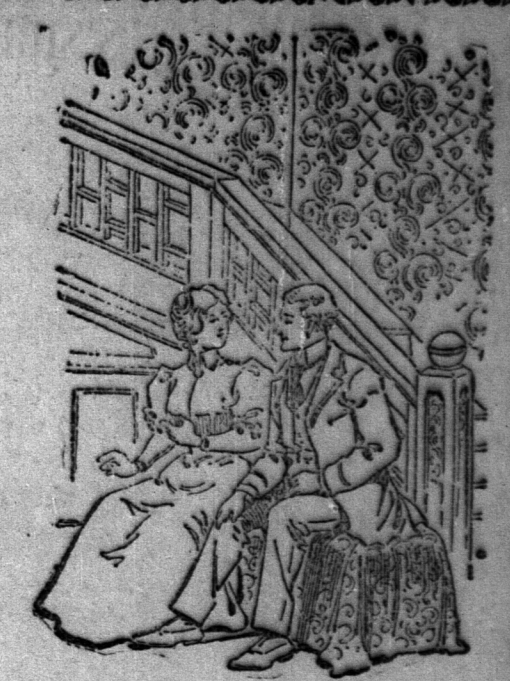
Mr. W. P. Pickard left last night by the mail express en route to Pictou where he will spend a few days, after which he will visit Sydney C. B.
