Mr. Calbeck is the Island Manager of the Frost and Wood, Co. and finds Central Bedeque, more adaptable for his headquarters than Searletown.

Mrs. W. Bradshaw, still continues quite poorly, but friends are hoping that, the summer months will bring to her a new lease of life. Mrs. Bradshaw has been ill for some time, and such sicknesses are always very severe in their after effects. The Community hopes that a distinct improvement will soon be visible.

The many friends of Mr. Davis Schurman of Freetown, sympathize with him in his recent sad bereavement. The late Mrs. Schurman, was an estimable lady in every way, and endeared herself to all who knew her. A life long member of the Baptist Church, and always interested in its welfare, she was buried from the home, and Central Bedeque Baptist Church, on Monday May 10th.
