SUPREME COURT.—This morning at 11 o'clock a. m., the Oath of Allegiance to His Majesty King Edward VII, will be administered to the Master of the Rolls, the Vice-Chancellor, the Judges of the County Courts, Surrogate and Judge of Probate, the Attorney-General, the Clerk of the Crown, the King's Councillors, the Sheriff, Barristers and Attorneys of the Court.

McLEOD vs Hughes—Action of Trespass, which has been before the Chief Justice and a Jury since Monday last, was concluded last evening when the Jury found a verdict for the defendant. The evidence for the defence and in rebuttal was closed yesterday morning after which Mr. Stewart Q. C. addressed the Jury for the defendant and Mr. Morson Q. C., replied for the plaintiff. The Jury after the Chief Justice had charged them, retired and after an absence of over an hour returned with their verdict. This being the last case the Jury were paid off and discharged. The Martin-McKinnon election trial begins on Monday.

YESTERDAY work was commenced by Messrs. B. C. Prowse, S. A. McLeod and E. Chandler upon the decorations to the interior of the Post Office. Over the main entrance is a portrait of Her Majesty suitably draped in black. Over the general delivery is another photograph surmounted with a wreath of waxed lilies. The stamp wicket is nicely draped in black and trimmed with white cord and tassels. The rear entrance shows another portrait draped, and the sides are covered with black tied with white ribbon. So far as the work has progressed it is neat and tasteful in design and reflects much credit on those having the work in charge.

The annual social and concert of the junior members of the League of the Cross was held in the Lyceum last night. The attendance was very large.

The funeral of the late Donald W. Palmer, Victoria, took place yesterday afternoon and was largely attended. Rev. Leo Williams officiated.

The memorial service will be held in St. Pauls church on Sunday morning. Last night the draping of the church was in progress. The main entrance, pulpit and chancel, including communion table and choir pews are being draped.

A very enjoyable evening was spent in York hall on Wednesday, Jan. 24th; the event being a banquet given under the auspices of the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association of that place. The hall was tastefully decorated with the various products of the soil adapted to our climate. Directly in front of the platform might be seen the picture of Her Majesty the Queen heavily draped and on the opposite side His Majesty King Edward VII. Conspicuous among the guests assembled were Senator Ferguson and Lady, Rev. F. Hicks, and wife. The tables literally groaned under the burden of the many delicacies provided by the ladies. After the satisfying of the wants of the inner man the usual toasts were proposed and drunk in the following order:

The monotony of the proceedings was broken by suitable selections from the choir. The event of the evening was the response to the toast—"Our Dominion" by Senator Ferguson. He referred in a very pleasing manner to our possibilities as a country, to the fertility of our soil, the variety and abundance of our natural resources, the salubrity of the climate and the marked intelligence of our people. He referred very touchingly to the demise of our late and much lamented sovereign, Queen Victoria, her admirable qualities as a wife, as a mother, and as a leader of men.
