The Husband Who Thinks Caring for Children and the House is all a Wife Need Worry About Needs to be Quickly Disillusioned

A three years' scientific survey has just been completed in which the major problems that come into girls' and women's lives have been studied and analyzed, and it has been found that they have seven thousand four hundred different conundrums to solve and worry over.

To begin with, as soon as a girl baby gets out of the cradle she has to commence worrying about her looks, for ever since she was possessed of the disposition of an angel and the brains of a college president, they avail her little unless she is also easy on the eyes.

It takes little less than a miracle-worker to change a salaratus biscuit complexion into one of cream and roses; to turn ash-colored, stringy locks into golden curls; to convert a feather-bed figure into the similitude of a telephone pole.

Then girls have to wrestle with the problem of how to get dates and eventually acquire a husband. As there is no reliable formula for this they have to work out for themselves and try to find out what moodily appeals to the masculine fancy.

Shall they be gay and vivacious, or gentle and demure? Shall they be independent or clinging vines? Shall they drink a boy under the table, or say "the lips that touch wine shall never touch mine"?

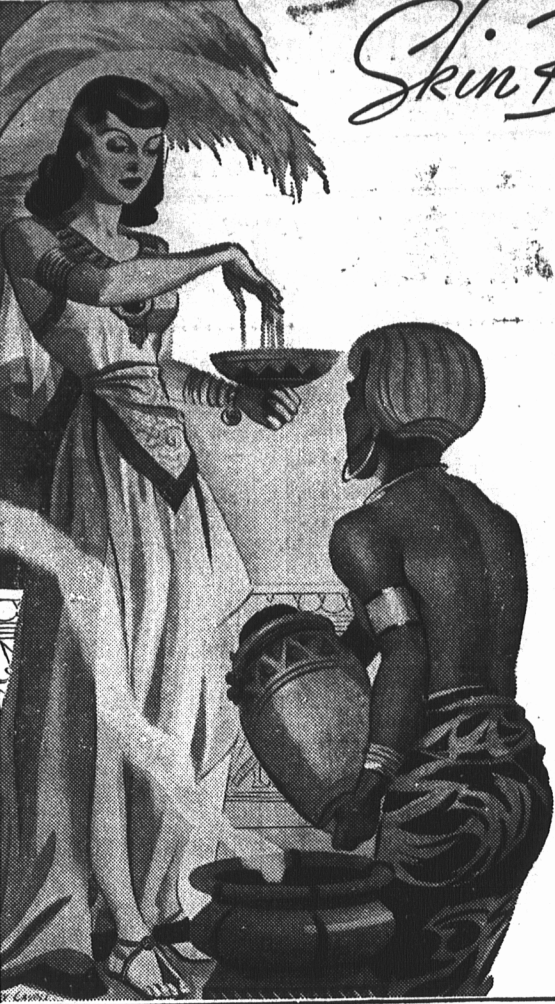

THE COOK'S CORNER

FLAKY PASTRY 1-2 cup flour 1-2 teaspoon salt 1-2 cup cold shortening 1 teaspoon vinegar Cold water. Method: Did you ever try using a little vinegar in your pastry? You'd be surprised what a difference it makes. You add it to the egg whites and mix and then you make the pastry taste, but it seems to give it a flakier texture than you get any other way. Sift the flour and salt, then add the shortening and cut it in coarse bits, using a pastry fork or two knives. But never your fingers—that melts the shortening, which is what you must avoid at all costs. Leave some of the bits of shortening as large as beans and none of them any finer than grains of rice, and make sure that each particle is coated with flour. Now add the vinegar to the water, about a half cup of water, which should be ice cold. Add this, just a little at a time, until the dry ingredients cling together—no more. Turn on to a lightly floured pastry cloth and pat into a flat cake. Roll lightly in all directions to about 1-8 inch thick. Fit into a pie pan, crimp the edges, and bake in a hot oven (425 deg. F.) over for about 15 minutes, until a delicate brown. Cool and fill.

Now for the coconut custard filling—and let this cool also before turning it into the shell.

KITCHEN HOLD-ALL

If you want to keep your cleaning equipment all handy and your kitchen tidy, you will want the possibilities of the hold-all. It can be hung on the inside or outside of any kitchen door, and can be made of any cheap washable material. To make a hold-all about two feet square, two yards of 31-inch material will be ample. Cut out a piece slightly larger than two feet square. This is for the foundation, or the back. It can either be hemmed or bound with cotton bias binding in a contrasting color. The rest of the material is cut up to make the pockets. Make them of varying sizes so that you can tuck all sorts of odds and ends into them. If you bind all the pockets before sewing them on, the finished hold-all will be very gay. But if you are too busy, then an ordinary hem will be sufficient. Sew a loop of tape securely to the top corners, and your hold-all is ready for service.
