MONTREAL, July 7.—A cable received today from the offices of the Canadian National Railways announces the organization of a team of English lady lawn tennis players to tour Canada and the United States for a series of matches at various points.

The team will sail on the S.S. Ascania, Cunard Line, leaving the other side on Saturday, and will be composed of Miss E. H. Harvey, Miss Betty Nicholl, Miss Joan Fry, Miss G. R. Storr, and Mrs. J. Hill. Major D. R. Larcombe, Secretary of Wimbledon, will accompany the party.

The visiting tennis players will land at Quebec and will afterwards proceed to Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto and Niagara Falls, then crossing to play at Buffalo before going on to New York.

In the Dominion they will travel over the lines of the Canadian National Railways.

**BASEBALL**

**DEMPSEY CONFIDENT**

Jack Dempsey is satisfied that he will again be the devastating body uncher of pre-championship days when he touches gloves with Jack Sharkey at the charity of the opening going on the night of July 21st.

Eased in mind by rugged training that has kept him physically active every waking moment since he suicide of John Dempsey, his wife, rolling his wife in schenectady last Saturday, Jack is certain that he can and will retain the sledge-hammering power that carried him to the world's heavyweight championship over Jess Willard's punch-bleed bulk on the fourth of July eight years ago.

According to reports Jack surprised critics in early workouts when he speed to sacrifice development to speed for temporary display of socking power. The wearing attack of the former title holder slowly is developing into a fast, head bowed charge that carried him through the straight-hand punches into close quarters, where Jack slams away effectively with both hands to the body. But the Dempsey who is showering punches today on a half dozen sparring partners is anything but the lithe tiger man who smashed Willard into a helpless bleeding bulk in three rounds on the fourth of July, 1919.

Dempsey that day was 183 lbs; of blinding speed and terrific punching power and probably in the finest condition he ever attained for any bout but his match with Luis Firpo in September, 1923.

Today the former king of his class snies 201, according to the report of Jerry Luvadas, although he appears to all who see him several pounds over that weight and heavy about the shoulders and waistline.

The match will take place on July 21st, at the Yankee Stadium, Tex Rickard, the well known promoter, confidently expects gate receipts amounting to \$1,000,000, of which each of the principals will receive 25 percent.

**"BAMBINO" BESTED**

**Three Americans To Battle Five Canadians For Golfing Title**

HAMILTON, July 7.—As a result of today's second round match in the Canadian amateur golf championship at Ancaster, three of the four third round matches tomorrow will be international affairs, the field having been reduced to three Americans one of them being Frank Thompson, a Canadian, playing for the Kingston Club, of Chicago, and five Canadians. Three of the survivors of today's play are former winners of the title, Frank Thompson, 1924 and 1924 champion; Don Carrick, winner in 1925, and Sandy Somerville, the defending champion.

The Thompson, brothers, Stanley and Frank were principals in the closest matches of the day, Stanley being carried to the home hole before he eliminated W. Henderson, of the London Hunt, 2 up, while Frank was carried to the thirty-fifth by J. C. MacKie, before winning 2 and 1.

Don Carrick and Somerville, both of whom are in the lower half of the draw, showed strong form in today's matches. Somerville was especially strong against Paul Hyde, of the Barham Country Club, although the latter kept on his till the sixth hole in afternoon. Somerville drew away with successive birdies at the sixth and seventh and made the score four-hole, three up. He lost little time after that winning three of the next four holes and having the other.

**The Markets**

OTTAWA, Ont., July 7.—Higher price levels are reported from some points in the west today and a generally steady feeling continues to prevail on egg markets.

Toronto.—The market is unchanged dealers quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered cases returned extras 32 to 34; firsts 30 to 32; seconds 24 to 27. A car is offered from Winnipeg but not sold at extras 34 1-2, firsts 30 1-2, seconds 27 1/2.

Montreal.—The egg market here is steady and unchanged. There are more liberal offerings of eggs from Ontario. Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 33 to 35; firsts 29 to 31; seconds 27 to 29.

Winnipeg.—This market is unshaken at dealers quoting country shippers' extras 29, firsts 27, seconds 21 to 23; delivered cases included.

Regina.—Prices to country shippers have advanced here one cent and dealers are now quoting extras 23, firsts 25, seconds 20. A current paying prices are also advanced to extras 23, firsts 25, seconds 19.

Vancouver.—This market is steady with dealers quoting producers extras 27-28, firsts 25-26, pullets extras 22-24.
