This book, he said, should be approached with a great deal of respect because it is the service book, from which our forefathers of many generations have worshipped. We are already thirty-seven years into the twentieth century and this book of worship has been in constant use since the middle of the sixteenth century. It is the first complete service book in the English tongue and stands as a monument to the liberty which is ours of worshipping God in our own language.

It stands on the bed rock of Holy Scripture and is in itself a very mosaic of Scripture. A book of common prayer, it engages the worship of all; and king and peasant alike find solace in its words. Simple and comprehensive it offers great liberty of worship; while at the same time it rings true to the great teachings of the Christian faith. For the fact that it satisfies proof is found in the fact that it has been used through so many years. It attracts them to the Christian faith and builds them up in that faith. The preacher exhorted his hearers to use the book honestly and reverently, and to receive to the full its leadership in the Christian faith.

At the evening service the Rev. G. Gillespie took as his subject: "Christ the Sin Bearer." He emphasized the text, "Behold the Lamb of God, that taketh away the sin of the world." St. John 1:29. The speaker outlined various examples of sin in the world and asked "What is the solution to the sin problem?" St. Paul's answer was—"The wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life, through Jesus Christ our Lord." Continuing, the speaker showed that in God's Divine Providence and mercy, He provided a Lamb, which would take away the sin of the world, and that Lamb was Jesus. In the words of St. John, the speaker urged upon his hearers to look by faith unto the Lamb of God, that taketh or beareth away the sin of mankind, and in that act of faith, the sinner one will pass from death unto life. At the evening service there was celebration of Holy Communion. The Anthem of evening prayer was "Sweet The Moments Rich in Blessing" T. Edwin Solly. The solo parts were taken by Mr. P. D.
