WHAT CANADA EXPORTS AND WHERE IT GOES.

Canada exported during the year ended with March, 1910, of domestic produce \$279,211,537 worth. This was something more than the exports for 1911, but will serve as an example of what the Dominion has to sell and where it is sold. These exports were classified as follows:

It will be seen from the above table that of 139 millions worth that Canada sold in Britain 112 millions was the products of the farm, or four-fifths of the whole, while of 104 millions worth sold to the States less than 19 millions represented farm products. We sold in Britain about six times as much of what our farmers produce, as we sold in the States. The larger part by far of what we sold to the States was made up of lumber, manufactures and minerals, these three items making a total of over 80 1/2 millions of dollars.

It is entirely clear that in selling five-sixths of all our farm surplus in Great Britain we sold it there in competition with the United States, Argentina, Australia and all those twelve most favored nations of which we sometimes hear. All those nations and peoples had access to the free British market on precisely the same terms as Canada and the Canadians. It is also true that while this mainly selling their surplus in the British market our farmers have prospered abundantly. And it is entirely clear that reciprocity can in no way close the British market to our farmers. We shall have the same free access to that great market as heretofore.

What reciprocity is designed and

farm products made up 144 millions out of a total of 279 millions that we had to sell abroad, or considerably more than one-half of the total. It so happens also that Great Britain was the purchaser of just as nearly as may be one-half of all that we had to sell, and of a good deal more than half of what was exported from the farms, as the following table will show.

For the year 1910 the exports of different classes of products from Canada to Great Britain and the United States respectively were as follows:

expected to do for Canada is to give our farmers another free market in which there are twice as many consumers as there are in the British Isles, a market much nearer than Britain, but from which our farmers have been for forty years shut out by almost prohibitive duties. The one condition upon which we gain this privilege is that American farmers shall have equally free access to the Canadian market. And there are some who fear that we shall not be able to compete with the Americans and so must suffer loss.

This is the crucial question. But the answer is that already above stated. It is not really a new experiment that our farmers will be trying. They have been for forty years competing with American farmers, and with the farmers and producers of all the world, in the British market, and have proved themselves well able to compete and prosper. The advocates of reciprocity believe that the trade agreement will enable us to sell much of our surplus farm products in the States at better profit than we can in England. If they are right reciprocity will prove a boon to us. Even if they are wrong, the British market remains as good as before for us. Why need we be afraid?

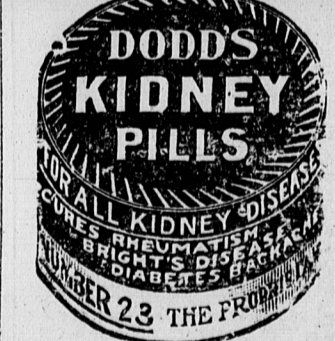

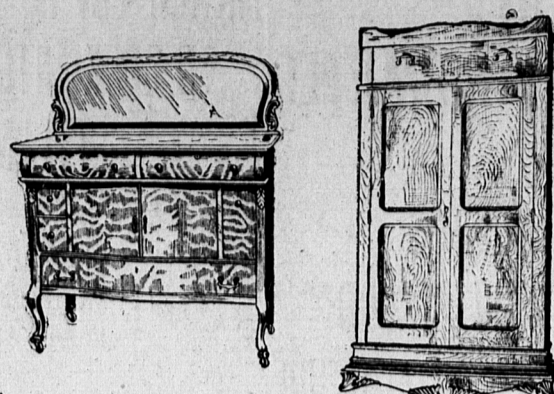
