—CLOSURE INTRODUCED

amid cheers from the Conservatives. Sir Wilfred and Mr. Hazen rose simultaneously. The speaker decided that the Leader of the Opposition had caught his eye first.

Mr. Hazen remained standing, there was considerable objection from the Opposition and the speaker put the motion that Mr. Hazen be heard. Amid loud and continued shouting by the Liberals the division was taken at 5.10 the motion carried by 105 to 67. One nationalist Mr. Lavallee, voted against the motion. The Liberals yelled with rage as member after member rose to vote on the Government side.

Mr. Pugsley then moved the adjournment of the House. It was about 5.25 and he filled in until six with obstruction talk. When the speaker had left the chair the Opposition stood up and cheered Sir Wilfred and sang O Canada.

(Sir Wilfred Laurier followed complaining against closure which he termed gag. Similar situations as that on the Naval Bill had come in other years. The recourse was an appeal to the people instead of force. "I appealed to the people in 1911," he said, "and was beaten. I had rather stand here in Opposition than stand there" (pointing to Government benches) "kept in office by the power of gag. (Hon. C. J. Doherty followed.)

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, April 9.—The closure resolution was introduced in House of Commons this afternoon. It was made the occasion of a spirited debate the feature of which was that Liberal leaders lost their temper. The debate will be resumed tomorrow.

TO SOLVE FARM MARKETS PROBLEM.

CHICAGO, Ill., April 8.—A notable gathering of country bankers, railroad officials, economists, agricultural experts and other persons interested in the welfare of the American farmer and the American public in general met in Chicago today and entered upon a three-day discussion of the important problem of marketing and credits. The conference is in line with the letter addressed by President Taft a year ago to the governors of the different states proposing a farm credit system as a means for reducing the cost of production of food products and resulting in ultimate relief to the consumer from the high cost of living.

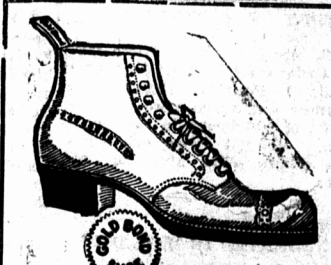
