THE death of Ella V. H. Prows eldest daughter of Silas and Agnes Prows of Brackley Pt. Road will be learned with regret by all who knew her. The deceased had been attending school up to the Christmas Season when she was one of the first to become subject to an attack of hooping-cough which has since spread throughout the whole community, and although the attack was a more than usually severe one, she was after being confined to her bed for some time, thought to be recovering and was again up about the house helping with the care of her smaller sisters. But before long she was again stricken and after lingering illness of from five to six weeks, during which she endured great suffering with a patience and fortitude hardly to be expected from one so young, she passed peacefully away on the morning of Tuesday March 19th, aged thirteen years and six months.

Her presence in the day school, though of necessity her attendance there was not very regular, being almost the only helpmate of her parents, was always marked by a diligence, gentleness and obedience that was almost unsurpassed. Her conduct towards her schoolmates was of such cheerful and gentle character that she could not but be beloved of all, and of none more than her teacher. Her attendance to the wants of the small children and especially perhaps to her own younger sisters, whose care she seemed naturally to take upon herself in the absence of her parents, was most marked and certainly worthy of more mature years, and it may truly be said the general feeling of all is her place in school can never be filled. When in health her seat in Sabbath School was never vacant and while there the same gentleness and good behavior always characterized all her actions. On more than one occasion has the remark been heard from the Superintendent, "What a nice girl Ella Prows is, how I like to have her in Sunday School." She will be missed by both teachers and scholars. And if their loss is so much felt by others what must it be by those of her own home. She leaves behind her parents, four small sisters to mourn their loss and to these are tendered the sincere sympathy of all. The funeral took place on Thursday at 2 o'clock to Sherwood Cemetery, attended by a large procession of sorrowing friends and relatives. For Peace with the Boers, Chamberlain Says

QUEENSTOWN AFRAID

China's Action With Regard to Manchuria—Ministers Are Perplexed.

UNCERTAINTY IN CHINA.

PEKIN, March 25.—(Special).—China's time in which to sign the Manchuria agreement expires to-morrow.

It is not yet known what will be done. The Foreign Ministers are greatly worried over how to police the Legation quarters since the disturbed relations between the powers.

YESTERDAY the much talked of cargo winch built and manufactured by Messrs Bruce Stewart & Co. for the Steamer Princess was given a trial the result of which was entirely satisfactory to the Chief Engineer, Mr. Cuming. The winch is friction driven, is noiseless, non-vibrating and the weight is lowered by friction. In opening the throttle valve the brake is detached and the load is lowered, one lever controlling both, which is a vast improvement from the old fashioned one with its extra foot lever and cog gears. By the noiselessness of the winch passengers will be freed from the continuous noise as in the past, when the old style cog was in use. Bruce Stewart & Co. are manufacturing a similar winch for the Railway to be used in connection with a boiler (7 ft in height 3ft in diameter) which they are also supplying. They have also orders in for a boiler (11 ft 6 in x 4 ft.) for Prince Street School and another, 8 x 3 for Goff Bros.
